Weather

Myanmar Daily Weather Report

Issued at 7 pm Saturday, 18 July 2026

BAY INFERENCE: Monsoon is moderate over the Andaman Sea and the Bay of Bengal. The weather has a few clouds over the North Andaman Sea and is partly cloudy over the South Andaman Sea and over the Bay of Bengal.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL MORNING OF 19 July 2026: Rain or thundershowers will be scattered in Mandalay, Magway and lower Sagaing regions and Kayah and Chin states, fairly widespread in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, Bago and Ayeyawady regions and Rakhine and southern Shan states and widespread in the remaining regions and states, with likelihood of isolated heavy falls in upper Sagaing Region and Kachin State. The degree of certainty is 100 per cent.

THE CONDITION OF CUMULONIMBUS CLOUD: The cumulonimbus clouds are developing in Kachin State. In the area along the movement of cumulonimbus clouds, weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied by rain, thunder, lightning and hail may occur. Therefore, it is recommended to be aware of these phenomena in advance.

STATE OF THE SEA: Squalls with moderate to rough seas are likely at times off and along the Myanmar Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 25-30 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 7-9 feet off and along the Myanmar Coasts.

OUTLOOK FOR THE SUBSEQUENT TWO DAYS: Likelihood of an increase in rain in Yangon, Bago, upper Sagaing and Ayeyawady regions and Kachin, Kayin, Chin and Mon states.

FORECAST FOR NAY PYI TAW AND NEIGHBOURING AREA FOR 19 July 2026: Isolated rain or thundershowers. The degree of certainty is 100 per cent.

FORECAST FOR YANGON AND NEIGHBOURING AREA FOR 19 July 2026: Isolated rain or thundershowers. The degree of certainty is 80 per cent.

FORECAST FOR MANDALAY AND NEIGHBOURING AREA FOR 19 July 2026: Isolated rain or thundershowers. The degree of certainty is 100 per cent. — DMH

Flood Bulletin

ACCORDING to the 6:30 am MST observation today, the water level of the Sittoung River at Madauk has exceeded by about one foot above its danger level. It may fall about three inches during the next one day and may remain above its danger level.

It is especially alert to the people who settle near the river banks and low-lying areas in Madauk, to stay away from the flood-prone areas. — DMH

Thanlyin No 1 Oil Refinery Set for Phase I Launch in Sept

President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar U Min Aung Hlaing called for improving the refining efficiency of oil refineries to ensure greater confidence in the quality of domestically produced petroleum fuels during his inspection of No 1 Oil Refinery (Thanlyin) yesterday.

The President outlined that if the refinery is operational, it will create employment opportunities for residents while enabling domestically required fuels to be purchased and used at lower cost. Moreover, as fuel imports from abroad can be reduced, the country's foreign currency expenditure will also decrease, he added.

The President noted that the successful completion of Phase I of the refinery operation represents a milestone achievement for the government, and arrangements must also be made to ensure a continuous supply of the raw materials required for the operation of the refinery.

Phase I of the modular No 1 Thanlyin Oil Refinery will produce 500,000 tonnes of fuel annually, subject to the availability and volume of raw material supplies.

Union Minister for Electricity and Energy U Ko Ko Lwin reported to the President on the efforts to implement the Phase I as the modular type refinery to produce 500,000 tonnes of fuel per year depending on the availability and vol-

ume of raw material supplies, process of building the refinery in Phase I and II, laying the pipelines to transport crude oil and oil products, placing the pipeline for natural gas, production of machinery parts, and a plan to com-

mence the operation of the Phase I of the refinery in September.

He added that upon the completion of Phase II, the refinery will be capable of producing and distributing 60 per cent of the country's petroleum requirements

and 50 per cent of its diesel requirements.

After inspecting the oil refinery, the President viewed the display of documents related to oil and natural gas production, the oil production process in successive eras and the use

of relevant equipment at the Energy Museum.

He also reviewed the progress in the construction of Phase I of the oil refinery and guided the Union Minister for Electricity and Energy and officials.

Myanmar's VP visits prominent sites in China

VICE-PRESIDENT of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Nan Ni Ni Aye led the Myanmar delegation to visit the South-East Tibet Museum and the Yani National Wetland Park in Nyingchi (Linzhi), Xizang Autonomous Region, People's Republic of China.

On arrival at the South-east Tibet Museum, the museum official clarified on the museum's history, ancient cultural heritage, traditional artefacts of various ethnic groups, costumes, silverware, lifestyles and customs of ethnic communities, sports, and historical events displayed in the galleries. At the Yani National Wetland Park in Nyingchi (Linzhi), the official explained the park's environmental conservation ef-

forts, forest and watershed management, biodiversity protection, ecosystem restoration programmes and initiatives to promote nature-based tourism. The Vice-President raised questions on matters of interest and toured the park's nature trails, viewing platforms, the Yarlung Tsangpo River and its surrounding natural scenery. Located along the banks of the Yarlung Tsangpo River, the national wetland park is a prominent ecological area that preserves high mountain ranges, lush forests, wetlands and rich biodiversity in their natural state.

Yangon Region to Lead the Way in Food Security

Agricultural and livestock breeding zones aim to meet the daily demand for meat, fish, eggs, and various vegetables for the approximately eight million population in Yangon Region.

President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar U Min Aung Hlaing, during his inspection trip to agricultural and livestock zones in Yangon Region, gave guidance to officials of relevant zones yesterday.

In inspecting the zones, the President unveiled that the implementation of agricultural and livestock breeding zones in various regions is not primarily aimed at generating profits; rather, it is mainly intended to ensure that the public can purchase and consume sufficient quantities of meat, fish, and seasonal crops at affordable prices.

Accompanied by Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker U Khin Yi, Amyotha Hluttaw Speaker U Aung Lin Dwe, Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services General Ye Win Oo and Union ministers, the President inspected the Thilawa In-

tegrated Agriculture and Livestock Zone in Kyauktan Township.

In a meeting with officials of the zone, the President outlined that the implementation of agricultural and livestock breeding zones in the Yangon Region is intended to help meet the daily demand for meat, fish, eggs, and various vegetables for the region's popu-

lation of about eight million people.

He continued to mention the meat, fish, milk and dairy products from Thilawa Agriculture and Livestock Zone, Fish Farming Zone in Shwemayin and 26th-Mile Integrated Agriculture and Livestock Farm can contribute greatly to the food supplies for residents in Yangon Region.

In explaining the aims of the agriculture and livestock zones, the President noted that as the Yangon Region has many factories and industries, as well as a large population, production of meat, fish, and seasonal crops must be increased to balance supply and demand and control the rising prices of basic food commodities.

Guidance provided by the President in inspecting agriculture and livestock zones

- 1.Integrated Agriculture and Livestock Farm can contribute greatly to the food supply of residents in Yangon Region.
- 2.Various types of machinery, including agricultural machinery needed in the Yangon Region, should also be manufactured as finished products.
- 3.Rubber cultivation in Yangon Region must help produce high-value rubber products.

He underscored that land use in each zone must also be managed efficiently, and agricultural and livestock farming activities should be expanded. At the same time, systematic measures must be taken to increase productivity and yields.

The President guided that Yangon, which was formerly the capital of the country, possesses many strong foundations as an economically strategic city, a developed city, and a city with a concentrated community of intellectuals and professionals. Therefore, it must serve as a leading model for other cities, and continued efforts should be made to ensure food security and convenience for the region.

Concerning rubber cultivation in Yangon Region, the President instructed officials to focus on producing high-value rubber products.

Regarding MSME businesses, the President pointed out that various types of machinery, including agricultural machinery needed in the Yangon Region, should also be manufactured as finished products.

He instructed that the MSME-based economy should be operated through a cooperative system, and agricultural and livestock farming businesses in the Yangon Region can be further developed beyond their current level.

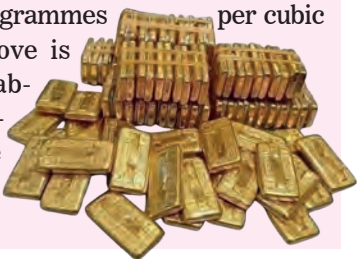

The damaged houses and public buildings in Falam caused by terrorist incidents are being repaired and reconstructed on a daily basis through the joint efforts of religious leaders, pastors, respected clergy, community elders, members of the Tatmadaw, police and firefighters, health and education staff, and district and township departmental officials.

On arrival at the 200-bed township hospital, the Union minister inspected ongoing cleaning activities carried out using both manpower and machinery, as well as the removal of damaged structural components. He instructed

officials to systematically collect and store reusable materials salvaged from buildings designated for demolition, including roofing sheets, timber, iron grilles, steel doors, doors and window panels, frames, water supply equipment and electrical materials.

A temporary public hospital has been opened in Falam, where the medical superintendent and 84 healthcare personnel have provided medical treatment to 1,554 patients. The facility has been serving not only residents of the town but also people from surrounding villages. Moreover, the township hospitals in Tiddim, Tonzang and Falam are also open with 285 doctors and health staff providing treatment to 14,124 patients with the use of labs, medical supplies and medicines provided by the government. — MNA/KTZH

Myanmar Embassy to Singapore issues 4 visitor guidelines

THE Myanmar Embassy to Singapore issued four guidelines on 17 July for Myanmar nationals to observe when visiting the embassy.

For the concern on the image of Myanmar nationals and under complaints lodged by neighbours, those who will visit the embassy for passport extension and consular services are urged to be aware of the following rules: do not block the entry of neighbouring residences while waiting for admission, do not make gathering, eating, littering, smoking and spitting betel nut in front of the embassy campus and the surrounding.

In addition, it has also urged not to have conversations or speak on the telephone loudly. Blocking entry, littering, smoking and spitting betel nut are also prohibited inside the embassy campus. — MT/ZS

Indian firm to build soybean oil plant in Pathein Industrial Zone

AN Indian company will build a soybean crushing, oil extraction and refining plant in Pathein Industrial Zone to produce refined soybean oil for the domestic market, according to the Ayeyawady Region government.

The project will be implemented through cooperation between Green Rise Company Limited of Myanmar and Super Power Trading Company Private Limited of India. The joint venture will purchase black gram produced in Ayeyawady Region for processing and export to India, while importing soybean meal for fish feed production to supply fish farms across the region.

The companies also plan to export about 20,000 tonnes of black gram per month, or around 200,000 tonnes a year, together with other products from the region, from Pathein Port to Chennai Port in India. They will also import Indian products required for the domestic market, according to the report. — ASH/KZL

2025-26 Fruit Exports Miss Target

MYANMAR’S fruit exports in the 2025-2026 financial year reached only 63.98 per cent, falling short of the target, according to data from Myanmar Fruit, Flower and Vegetable Producers and Exporters Association.

Nearly 800,000 tonnes of fruits were targeted for exports in the previous FY, with an expected export value of US\$344.63 million. The actual fruit export was approximately 400,000 tonnes, generating \$220.53

termelons, muskmelons, avocados, konjac, ginger, turmeric, rosely cardamom, tamarind and cashew nuts. Of them, konjac and cashew nut topped the list with the highest export volume and earnings.

MFVP urged the growers and MSMEs to sort out fresh produce systematically for exports and to make value-added products rather than raw materials. — TWA/KK

Myanmar, Uzbekistan Discuss Business Forum, ASEAN-CIS Market Links

MYANMAR and Uzbekistan held discussions on 16 July at the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) to organize a bilateral business forum and forge trade links between the ASEAN and Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS) markets.

The coordination meeting focused on preparations for the bilateral business forum scheduled for August, as well as strategies to establish market connectivity between the CIS and ASEAN regions.

During the meeting, the two sides identified agriculture, food production, textiles, footwear, pharmaceuticals, electrical engineering, gemstones, chemicals, tourism, and education as sectors with strong potential for bilateral cooperation. They also discussed positioning Uzbekistan as a gateway for Myanmar businesses to access the CIS market. At the same time, Myanmar would serve as a gateway for Uzbek businesses seeking to enter the ASEAN market.

“We believe that Uzbekistan can serve as a mutually beneficial gateway to the CIS market, while Myanmar can provide a platform for Uzbek businesses to expand into the ASEAN market,” a representative of the Chamber of Commerce and Industry of Uzbekistan said.

Following the meeting, both sides agreed to strengthen direct business-to-business (B2B) linkages, promote cooperation among sector-specific business associations, and draft a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between their respective national chambers of commerce.

The Chamber of Commerce and Industry of Uzbekistan also expressed its expectation that around 50 leading Myanmar companies and business leaders will participate in the business forum to be held in Uzbekistan in August. — ASH/TH

Diesel price rebounds, petrol price declines

DIESEL prices have risen in the domestic energy market, despite a downtick in petrol prices.

Fuel oil reference prices this week ending 23 July were set at K3,210 for Octane 92, K3,285 for Octane 95, K3,175 for diesel and K3,895 for premium diesel.

The diesel prices indicated a slight increase of K80-105 per litre compared to last week’s price. Meanwhile, petrol prices (Octane 92 and Octane 95) showed a small decrease to K40 per litre this week.

The price index set by Mean of Platts Singapore (MOPS), the pricing basis for many refined products in South-East Asia, influences the domestic fuel prices, according to the Supervisory Committee on Oil Import, Storage and Distribution of Fuel Oil.

The committee is

governing the market to ensure a stable price and secure supply. Under the guidance of the Supervisory Committee, the Petroleum Products Regulatory Department has been issuing daily reference wholesale prices to ensure price stability for energy consumers.

The committee is inspecting the fuel stations to see whether they are overcharging. Authorities are taking action against fuel station retailers under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law 2017 if they are found to be overcharging rather than the set reference rate.

As per the statement, 90 per cent of fuel oil in Myanmar is imported, while the remaining 10 per cent is produced locally. Domestic fuel prices are highly correlated with international prices. The State is

steering the market to mitigate losses faced by the importers, sellers and energy consumers. Consequently, the government is trying to distribute the oil at a reasonable price compared to the price in regional countries.

Some countries levied higher tax rates and raised oil prices than My-

anmar’s. However, Malaysia’s oil sector receives government subsidies, and prices are about 60 per cent lower than those in Myanmar. Every country adopts different policies to fix oil prices, the Supervisory Committee on Oil Import, Storage and Distribution of Fuel Oil stated. — NN/KK

Laziness Does Not Exist

THIS week’s pick is a motivation book to re-ignite your drive to take action when you are carrying a heavy burden of unmet expectations and invisible stress in life, quoting “Are you feeling exhausted? Are you feeling used? Are you striving endlessly? Do you need to escape from life’s stress?”

Saya Lutha translated the book titled “Laziness Does Not Exist: A Defence of the Exhausted, Exploited, and Overworked” by the social psychologist and author from Loyola University Chicago into Myanmar.

Saya Lutha also authored books on psychology, linguistics, philosophy, sociology, musical arts and political science under the pen name ‘Maurisha’.

Meanwhile, he translates religious, unnatural phenomena, Gambhira (profound, abstruse, or hard to perceive) and Gandhari-magga (The Way of the Gandharan Arts) literature under the pseudonym ‘Aeruman’.

This book, which he has translated, is a scientific re-examination of the concept of “laziness” that spread through entire human societies. It exposes the toxicity of modern culture, which measures human worth through productivity, and points out that resting and accepting one’s own limitations is a fundamental aspect of psychological flexibility and self-compassion rather than being a source of shame.

Furthermore, the author

identifies the “Laziness Lie” as three major misconceptions deeply rooted in modern society: equating self-worth to productivity, that there is always more you could do, and that our own needs and limitations cannot be trusted.

The book also points out that behaviours labelled as “laziness” are outward signs of deeper struggles: depression, anxiety, ADHD, or burnout. Moreover, the average worker can only maintain deep-focused concentration for three to four hours per day, with the rest of the time needed for the brain to rest. This book serves as a source of comfort to those exhausted by the pressures of modern society, with the pursuit of endless

achievement that constantly demands “work harder, achieve more”.

The foreword by the original author states that people think I am a hardworking person. If I have to admit, I’ve put quite a bit of effort into creating that impression. I am a very organized, meticulous, and active person in others’ eyes. It took many years and deliberate effort to refine my personal brand. I had to put in a lot of effort to improve my creative skills, to keep my head above water for myself and for everyone who depends on me, and to be an active and significant figure in any situation.”

The book also conveys this message: When you can accept that ‘laziness’ can actually bring benefits and support positive outcomes for you. Finding ‘Me Time’ to protect mental well-being and bring inner peace is what truly matters most in your life. Although there are many great times to understand yourself, embracing idleness will surely find some positives and allow you to shift from problems and unproductive moments to beneficial thoughts and genuine self-discovery.”

Stakeholders to coordinate with egg distributors to curb price hikes

ACCORDING to the discussions held during the “Coordination Meeting on Reviewing Egg Production and Distribution,” relevant stakeholders will coordinate with egg distributors to ensure that egg prices do not continue to rise.

The coordination meeting, attended by executives of the Myanmar Livestock Federation (MLF), private stakeholders, and government officials, was held on 17 July at the MLF headquarters.

Attendees analyzed several factors contributing to the current situation, including rising production

costs, the imbalance between layer chick production and demand in previous years, decreased production over the past few months caused by disease outbreaks, and price fluctuations resulting from

a decline in supply.

Participants also suggested ways to ensure the long-term sustainability of layer farmers and distributors while keeping costs affordable for consumers.

Furthermore, the MLF stated that they will continue ongoing initiatives to ensure eggs’ affordable prices. The federation and relevant associations will work together to address issues across the supply chain to ensure stable production, as well as submit reports to the relevant authorities. Finally, it was noted that a meeting between the Myanmar Chicken and Duck Farmers Association and its member groups will be held soon to conduct a comprehensive review of the entire poultry sector. — MT/ZN

KBZMS GI launches 1st compensation payouts for MV ATK Nyein sinking

KBZMS General Insurance has paid an initial compensation amount exceeding K2 billion in connection with the sinking of the MV ATK Nyein, the company announced.

Nine days after the cargo vessel MV ATK Nyein sank, KBZMS General Insurance made its first compensation payments to affected policyholders under its Inland Marine Cargo Insurance coverage.

At approximately 11:30 am on 8 July, the MV ATK Nyein sank in Ye Township, Mon State, due to adverse weather conditions. The vessel went down about 27.5 nautical miles west of Kalgauk Island. Relevant maritime and administrative authorities subsequently declared the vessel a total loss and confirmed that all cargo on board was irretrievable.

Following confirmation of the incident, KBZMS immediately initiated the claims process and worked closely with policyholders, agents, surveyors, and relevant authorities to

expedite the verification and settlement of claims.

On 17 July, the first portion of compensation was paid to three affected policyholders in Yangon. Compensation payments to the remaining eligible policyholders in Myeik are ongoing.

“Our Inland Marine Cargo Insurance is designed to provide customers with the financial protection they need when unexpected events affect their businesses. Providing timely financial support helps our customers regain confidence and continue growing their businesses,” said U Sai Lu Mon Aung, Chief Executive Officer of KBZMS.

KBZMS has a track record of timely claims settlement under its domestic marine cargo insurance policies. In 2023, the company paid more than K700 million in compensation for the total loss of cargo aboard the MV Kyal Lin Phyto, which was transporting goods from Yangon to Myeik. — ASH/MKKS

Taunggyi tube-well construction inspected

Heavy Rainfall Warning No 18

ACCORDING to the observations at 6:30 am MST today, due to the strong monsoon over the Andaman Sea and Bay of Bengal and the Low-Pressure Area over India, rain or thundershowers are likely to be fairly widespread to widespread in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, Bago, upper Sagaing, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Kachin, Kayah, Kayin, Chin, Mon, Rakhine and Shan states with likelihood of isolated heavy falls from today morning to 26 July 2026.

Pakistan-China pharmaceutical cooperation to accelerate CPEC 2.0

Trump warns of tariffs on Canada over wildfire smoke

US President Donald Trump on Friday warned of increasing tariffs on Canada, accusing Ottawa of failing to properly man-

age its forests and prevent wildfire smoke from affecting air quality in American cities.

In a post on Truth So-

cial, Trump said the United States was being impacted by what he described as "filthy, polluted, and unhealthy air" from Canadian wildfires and said the cost of the pollution would be added to tariffs currently imposed on Canada.

"We are holding Canada responsible for the fact that they are not properly maintaining their forests, and brush therein, and the United States is being unnecessarily invaded by filthy, polluted, and unhealthy air, the quality of which is dangerous, and totally unacceptable!" Trump said. — ANI

Skyroot's Vikram-1 reaches orbit, marks new era for India's private space sector

SKYROOT Aerospace's Vikram-1 Test Flight-1 has successfully reached orbit, marking the maiden flight of India's first privately developed orbital-class rocket.

Earlier, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi mentioned the Skyroot Aerospace mission and wished them a successful launch. The rocket completed its final burn and injected its payloads into a nearly 450-kilometre orbit, making India the third country in the world with private orbital launch ca-

Monorail opens in northeastern Japan to boost tourism

A ceremony was held Saturday to mark the opening of a monorail in Kesennuma, Miyagi Prefecture, hit hard by the devastating 2011 earthquake and ensuing tsunami that triggered the accident at the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant. The monorail on Kesennuma Oshima, the biggest inhabited island in Japan's northeastern Tohoku region, connects the middle of 235-metre-high Mount Kameyama with its summit, where an observation terrace, walking paths and a cafe have been developed.

Commercial operations will begin Sunday. The mountain once had a chairlift, but it was destroyed by a fire caused by the disaster. Unlike the lift, which could not operate in bad weather, the monorail can run year-round.

Kesennuma Mayor Shigeru Sugawara said he hopes to use the new attraction to promote tourism, adding, "We have made something good and want to show the city's appeal." — Kyodo

Two oil tankers explode after entering mined route

TWO oil tankers exploded and caught fire after attempting to pass through a mined route in the southern part of the Strait of Hormuz, the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps said in a statement cited by IRNA.

The ships were deceived by US intelligence services into entering the dangerous route, the IRGC said.

The IRGC Navy reiterated that the Strait of Hormuz is "completely closed" due to US aggression and warned vessels not to enter mined routes.

"Until the aggression of criminal America ends, there is no possibility of exporting chemical fertilizer or even a single drop of oil and gas from this region," the statement said. — SPUTNIK

War plastic shortage boosts Cairo recyclers

IN the labyrinthine alleyways of Cairo’s Garbage City, recycling specialist Peter Romany finds himself fielding calls from factories scrambling for plastic to plug supply shortfalls caused by the Iran war.

The 25-year-old is among the hundreds of recyclers and manufacturers across Egypt benefiting from a war-driven surge in demand ever since the United States and Iran choked off the Strait of Hormuz — a major shipping lane for the raw materials from which plastic is made.

At the heart of the boom is the sprawling eastern Cairo settlement of Manshiyet Nasser, where generations of gar-

bage collectors have built one of the world’s most sophisticated informal recycling systems.

“Before the war, we were the ones calling factories, trying to sell our material,” Romany told AFP, standing beside towering bales of compressed plastic.

“But after the war broke out, the factories started calling us. They’d ask: How much do you have? Can you deliver today? That never used to happen.”

Home to more than 115,000 residents, Manshiyet Nasser is a predominantly Coptic Christian neighbourhood nestled beneath the Mokattam hill and facing Cairo’s historic Citadel. — AFP

Slovaks outraged by ministry's \$61-mln HQ

SLOVAKIA'S defence minister has come under fire for his lavish taste in architecture after unveiling his ministry's new 27-storey headquarters, with many criticising the cost of the 53-million-euro (\$61 million) renovation.

Known popularly as the "corn" because of its resemblance to the summer barbecue staple, the towering former communist-era barracks' facelift is already under scrutiny for potential misuse of the central European country's public funds.

"It's pretty, isn't it?" beamed the minister, Robert Kalinak, one of Prime Minister Robert Fico's closest allies, as he opened the building in the capital Bratislava to the public on Thursday.

Proposed ministry headquarters faced significant public and political backlash, with critics mocking the project as an "overpriced Dubai skyscraper" and "the most expensive corn in the world." The prosecutor's office is already investigating a criminal complaint regarding the 958,000-euro renovation of the tower's surrounding 700-metre wall. — AFP

Burnham vows hope as next UK PM

ANDY Burnham vowed Friday to restore "hope" to the British people as he officially became the ruling Labour party's new leader, and incoming UK prime minister.

Nicknamed the "King of the North" for a nine-year spell as Manchester mayor, Burnham pledged to work to improve living standards in every region of the United Kingdom.

"People and places ... have been waiting too long for politics to let them hope again ... We're going to give them hope back," he promised at a special party conference. "I am for us, for all of us," Burnham told cheering delegates.

The 56-year-old takes over from Keir Starmer, who resigned last month after months of political turmoil, scandal and domestic policy missteps. — AFP

JULY 16

India bans sailor deployment to Hormuz

INDIA'S Directorate-General of Shipping ordered shipowners and recruitment companies to not deploy Indian seafarers on vessels transiting the Strait of Hormuz amid renewed attacks on shipping.

The regulator said the risks to shipping in the Strait of Hormuz had increased "significantly". Over the past three days, two Indian seafarers have been killed in attacks on vessels in the region. At least seven Indian sailors have been killed and several others injured in and around the Strait of Hormuz since the escalation of the US-Iran conflict. "In view of the heightened security situation in the Persian Gulf region ... the Directorate considers it necessary to adopt enhanced precautionary measures to safeguard the interests of Indian seafarers serving on board ships operating in the region," the order said. — ANI

JULY 15

Foundation stone laid to build monastery in "Gateway of Everest"

A foundation stone has been laid for the construction of a monastery in Solukhumbu District of Nepal, which is also known as the gateway of Everest, to be built with Indian assistance.

As per the release from the Indian Embassy in Kathmandu, the foundation stone has been laid for the construction of Ngagyur Nyingma Palyul Dhongag Chholing Monastery in Likhu Pike Rural Municipality.

It "was jointly laid today by Mina Karki Basnet, Chairperson, Likhu Pike Rural Municipality; and Ajay Kumar Singh, Second Secretary, Embassy of India, Kathmandu," the release stated. The Monastery Building is being built with the Government of India's financial assistance of approximately 33 million Nepali rupees. — ANI

JULY 14

Trump pays Carroll millions for abuse

JEAN Carroll received the US\$5 million (\$6.45 million) plus interest that she won from Donald Trump in her sexual abuse lawsuit three years ago, days after the US President failed to sway a judge to block the transfer during a last-ditch appeal to the US Supreme Court.

A total of \$5.6 million (\$7.2 million) was transferred on 13 July by the US court system, which had been holding the money, to an account set up for Carroll by her lawyer Roberta Kaplan, according to a docket entry in the civil case in New York on 14 July.

A judge ordered the transfer after the Supreme Court on 29 June left intact a jury's verdict finding that Trump sexually abused Carroll in 1996 and defamed her in a 2022 social media post that called her claims a "hoax" and a "complete con job" and said that Carroll "is not my type!" — AFP

JULY 13

Police take over investigation into UK politician's killing

ANTI-TERRORISM police have taken charge of an investigation into the killing of veteran British right-wing politician Ann Widdecombe after fresh evidence emerged, the interior minister said Monday. Police said that a suspect detained at the weekend over the attack on the 78-year-old former Conservative minister has now been re-arrested on suspicion of committing, preparing or instigating "terrorism".

Home Secretary Shabana Mahmood announced that following "new information and evidence", Counter Terrorism Policing "are now leading on the investigation into the horrific murder" of Widdecombe, who was found dead Thursday at her home in southwest England. Police initially said there was "no information to suggest that this is a terrorism related incident". — AFP

JULY 12

US Senator Lindsey Graham dies suddenly at age 71

US SENATOR LINDSEY GRAHAM, a close political ally of President Donald Trump, died Saturday night "from a brief and sudden illness" at the age of 71, his office said in a statement early Sunday.

There was no indication the senator from South Carolina was feeling unwell before his death, NBC News cited a top staffer to Graham as saying early Sunday. He had been scheduled to appear on NBC News' "Meet the Press" on Sunday.

Graham, chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, was widely recognized as one of the most prominent and influential voices within the Republican Party on defence and foreign policy. He repeatedly pushed for aggressive US military actions abroad, maintaining a hawkish stance on Iran and vigorously defending the war. — Xinhua

Spain, Argentina prepare for World Cup final, Trump hails success

SPAIN and Argentina prepared to do battle in Sunday's World Cup final in New Jersey as organizers said they were keeping a close eye on smoke from wildfires in Canada.

Lionel Messi's Argentina are bidding to become the first team since Brazil in 1962 to win back-to-back World Cups, while Spain

are trying to win a second title after their maiden victory in 2010.

Organizers said they were "monitoring closely" the smoke that has choked skies over large areas of the United States. "There's been discussion about it, and we have somebody with the National Weather Service that sits in FIFA

headquarters there, so we're monitoring closely," Andrew Giuliani, White House World Cup taskforce executive director, told a briefing. US President Donald Trump will be among a crowd of over 80,000 spectators as the largest World Cup in history reaches its climax in the MetLife Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey.

It will be the only game of the tournament that Trump has attended.

Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum said she would also attend the final after an invitation from the American president.

Trump on Friday hailed the World Cup, also played in Mexico and Canada, as "the most successful sporting event perhaps in the history of the world" as he held a reception in New York with FIFA chief Gianni Infantino.

Physical battle

Spain captain Rodri said he was bracing for a "physical" battle with Argentina and would aim to ignore any possible "provocations".

Rodri, the 2024 Ballon D'Or winner, said he expected the final to be unlike any other game the European champions had faced. — AFP

Infantino's enlarged World Cup gamble pays off with punters

THE World Cup has engaged punters like never before with an 80 per cent increase in betting volume compared to the 2022 edition, even taking into account the higher number of matches for a 48-team tournament, a betting expert told AFP.

Although many football fans were sceptical about the increase in the number of teams from 32 to 48, it appears punters have welcomed it.

"We've seen an 80 per cent increase in the ticket volume," Darren Small, senior vice-president of Managed Trading Services at Sportradar, told AFP.

"So we're seeing more bets and more active customers.

"We've seen record numbers and we've surpassed our expectations in terms of what we felt we were going to see if we

compare it to 2022, which is a little difficult because it was different as it was in the winter."

For Sunday's final between Spain and defending champions Argentina, Small expects the company to be handling approximately 8.5 million betting tickets for their 250 bookmaking clients round the world.

Sportradar is a global sports technology company that says it creates immersive experiences for sports fans and bettors.

Small said even if the numbers have surprised the company, they anticipated an increase because of the expansion of the tournament to 104 games.

"But we also expected it just because of the industry growth and general growth," he added. — AFP

Petula Clark, 93, hopes real singers will survive the AI tide

Veteran singer Petula Clark hopes AI never replaces human emotion.

VETERAN British star Petula Clark hopes artificial intelligence will never be able to replace the warmth and emotion of a real singer. At 93, the “Downtown” legend still relishes the connection between audience and performer, and the humanity in delivering a vocal — two things AI songs might eliminate.

“We’re all very worried about that, and they’re actually saying eventually AI will have emotion, and even that’s a little worrying — where do we go from there?” said Clark. “For the future, it’s a little puzzling, to say the least,” she told AFP in an interview. Asked if the human feel in a song was irreplaceable, she said: “We like to think so. Who knows? The way things are going, maybe everything is going to be replaced anyway. I hope not. I find the whole thing a bit scary.”

“There’s been a lot of electronic stuff, computers in studios for quite a few years, and we’re OK, we’re still here. But how much longer?” Clark said her singing register was now lower, but the magic was still present. “My voice, it has changed,” she explained.

“But it hasn’t changed in whatever it has: it’s there. It’s come down a little bit, but I kind of like it!” “What I do is very personal, and it’s mine;

nobody can be me,” she said. “It comes from the heart.” Clark said there were plans for a concert in a London theatre, possibly later this year. “It’s going to be something very important for me, and very emotional too. It may be my last one; who knows?” she said.

“But I’m really looking forward to it, getting back to an audience. There’s nothing quite like the communion with an audience.” — AFP

Europe’s ‘Speedcubers’ twist for glory

Twelve hundred competitive speedcubers twist Rubik’s cubes for European glory.

BROWS furrowed, Juliette Sebastien grips her Rubik’s Cube and moves her fingers so fast the room seems to blur. In 25.03 seconds she flips the solved cube onto the table. This is speedcubing — competitive Rubik’s Cube solving — with events from blindfolded rounds to solving with oven gloves.

Sebastien, France’s national champion, is among 1,200 competitors from 53 countries at the 11th Eu-

ropean championships in Arnhem, eastern Netherlands. She trains at least an hour a day and did three to four hours daily before the event, though a wasp sting slowed her down. “I do training blocks of 100, 200, sometimes 300 solves,” the 25-year-old student told AFP. The five halls of the venue ring with the clack of cubes. Competitors wander the corridors in national shirts, solving one-handed

or without looking. “There are more cubes here than people,” joked Dutch programmer Jeroen Plug.

Competition is precise. Scramblers set every cube the same way, and players sit under referee watch with a camera recording while a digital clock times to hundredths of a second. Players get 15 seconds to inspect the scramble, then start the clock by touching a sensor. — AFP

Brazil toughens rules on gambling ads as bets explode

Brazil mandates addiction warnings on gambling advertisements.

BRAZIL on Friday made it mandatory for gambling advertisements to carry warnings about addiction and money loss, tightening regulations on a sector that has exploded in recent years, dragging many into debt. Brazil’s betting market has boomed since a regulatory framework was established in 2023, accompanied by aggressive advertising both on the streets and online from influencers and sports stars.

Controversy soared during the World Cup, with YouTube channel CaZeTV — which streamed all matches live to millions of people — showing QR codes to place bets and recommending specific wagers.

After a probe from the country’s consumer protection agency, the channel scaled back such ads. The goal is to “treat betting like cigarettes”, said Finance Minister

Dario Durigan of the new rules obliging betting ads to carry warnings.

Official figures show that most people using betting platforms come from poor households.

A study by the National Confederation of Commerce estimated that debt due to betting pushed almost 270,000 families into severe default over about three years. — AFP

Japan’s A-bomb art gallery seeks funding

AN art gallery in eastern Japan housing a series of paintings depicting the horrors of the 1945 US atomic bombings is scheduled to reopen next year after renovation but faces an uncertain future due to the expected mounting costs of operating the facility. Yukinori Okamura, managing director of the Maruki Gallery for the Hiroshima Panels, is seeking support to keep the legacy of the artwork alive. “The significance of these paintings is only growing,” as the number of atomic bomb survivors dwindles and fewer people remain to pass on their stories, he said.

Established in 1967, the gallery is located in Higashimatsuyama, Saitama Prefecture, and houses 14 works by the late, Nobel Peace Prize-nominated artists Iri and Toshi Maruki. The pieces are among the 15 folding screen paintings, one of which is permanently displayed at the Nagasaki Atomic Bomb Museum. The paintings, known as the Hiroshima Panels, have been exhibited abroad including in the United States. The museum has undergone several renovations, with its most recent closure taking place in September 2025. The aging building has suffered from rain leaks and humidity, which have damaged the artwork in recent years. — Kyodo
