## 10,000 more shade trees will be planted along roads in Magway, Yenangyoung, and Chauk this year

THE Yenantha Dinga Brothers Parahita has announced that it will plant 10,000 more shade trees along the roadsides of Magway, Yenangyoung, and Chauk in 2025.

More than 30,000 trees have been planted in the Philanthropic gardens in those areas in central Myanmar, and plans are underway to plant 10,000 more shade trees in vacant lands this year.

"We will water them. We are preparing to plant trees in the rainy season in 2025. We will plant tropical plants such as banyan and rain trees in the vacant spaces of the gardens that have already been planted along the left and right sides of the road in Magway, Yenangyoung and Chauk. Our goal is to plant 10,000 trees a year. We have started digging pits and selecting land. We will start planting when the rainy season arrives," said Ko Yenantha Dinga, founder of the group.

Planting trees in these gardens began in 2022, and there are now nine gardens filled mainly with neem, tamarind, eastern gooseberry, mango and rain trees.

To ensure the survival of the plants, the gardeners are provided with houses in the gardens and financial support as maintenance fees. — Thit Taw/ZN

## Shwethaungyan Beach welcomes more than 50,000 domestic, overseas visitors in December 2024

hwethaungyan Beach in Pathein Township, Ayeyawady Region, saw a total of 54,557 visitors, both domestic and international, in December 2024, according to Daw Cherry Myint, an Executive Officer of the Myanmar Tourism Entrepreneurs Association (Shwethaungyan Beach).

The beach has more than 20 hotels and guest houses offering service to visitors year-round.

"In 2024, Shwethaungyan Beach received 16,546 domestic and overseas visitors in September 2024, 17,857 in October, 24,545 in November, and 54,557 in December. Most of them made day trips. There is also an elephant camp near the beach, which attracts visitors year-round," Daw Cherry Myint said. Currently, measures are being taken at every hotel in Shwethaungyan Beach to ensure cleanliness along the beach in front of the hotel, beautify

#### Cybersecurity Law (State Administration Council Law No 1/2025)

#### **Continued from 4 January**

#### Chapter VI

#### Responsibilities and authority of the department

- 11. The department shall take responsibility for office works as the secretariat of the central committee and the steering committee.
- 12. The department shall allow expenses and allowances for members of the steering committee who are not in-service.
- 13. The department
- (a) can contact, coordinate and cooperate with international and regional cybersecurity organizations in accord with the directive of the ministry in implementing the cybersecurity cooperation measures internationally and regionally.
- (b) can issue recognition certificates by examining qualification of cybersecurity and skills or holding competitions in line with the international standards.
- (c) shall initiate sector-wise cybersecurity cooperation in the country under the directive of the ministry.
- (d) shall set disciplines for cybersecurity service and registration disciplines for digital platform service in accord with the approval of the ministry.
- (e) shall levy licence fees, registration fees, fine or other charges in line with the restrictions under this law.
- (f) shall take responsibilities for the implementation of cybersecurity policies, strategies, action plans and work guidelines adopted by the central committee.

#### **Chapter VII**

#### Protection of critical information infrastructure

14. The critical information infrastructures are as follows: -

- (a) Electronic information infrastructures for defence and security of the State
- (b) e-government service infrastructure
- (c) e-financial information infrastructure
- (d) e-transport information infrastructure
- (e) e-communications information infrastructure
- (f) e-health information infrastructure
- (g) e-electric power and energy information infrastructure

(h) Electronic information infrastructures set by the Central Committee from time to time in accord with the approval of the Union government

15. The Central Committee shall instruct the relevant government departments and organizations to designate, revise and manage critical information structures to carry out the tasks of planning and maintaining critical information infrastructure.

related to critical information infrastructures in accordance with the standards. (c) shall submit the report of critical information infrastructures to the ministry

via relevant government departments and organizations at least once every calendar year.

18. The ministry shall oversee and inspect whether those responsible for managing critical information infrastructure have implemented cybersecurity readiness in accordance with the standards set by the steering committee.

#### **Chapter VIII**

#### **Issuance of licence and registration**

19. The department can determine the validity period of licences for cybersecurity services and the registration period for digital platform services for a minimum of three years and a maximum of ten years.

20. A cybersecurity service provider must be a company registered under the Myanmar Companies Law and must also apply for a business licence from the relevant department in accordance with the prescribed regulations.

21. The department shall verify applications under the criteria in accord with Section 20 and conduct them as follows: -

- (a) if application is aligned with criteria, it needs to issue licence to applicant with paying licence fee
- (b) if application is not aligned with criteria, it needs to amend application or refuse to issue licence.

22. The cybersecurity service provider must apply for a licence extension to the relevant authority at least six months before the expiration of the licence if they wish to continue their operations.

- 23. The department
- (a) can allow the application for renewal of licence with verification in accord with the criteria or refuse it.

(b) refuses to extend the licence, it shall not affect the remaining licence term. 24. A digital platform service provider with over 100,000 users within the country must be a registered company under the Myanmar Companies Law, and in line with the registration criteria, an application must be submitted to the relevant department for approval.

25. The department must review the application in accordance with the criteria set forth in Section 24 and proceed as follows: -

(a) issuing the registration to an applicant with payment of registration fee if the application is aligned with relevant criteria

(b) otherwise, it must allow the applicant to amend the application or refuse to  $% \left( {{{\bf{b}}} \right)$ 

16. Relevant governments and organizations shall conduct measures for critical information infrastructures as follows: -

- (a) Scheming cybersecurity plans under relevant criteria
- (b) Formation of an Emergency Cybersecurity Incident Monitoring and Response Team
- (c) Assigning an appropriate person as an official to manage the critical information infrastructure
- (d) submission of a cybersecurity report to the Steering Committee at least once for every calendar year
- 17. The official who is responsible for managing the critical information infrastructure
- (a) shall keep the data related to the critical information infrastructure in accordance with the standards depending on the standards of information.

 $(b)\ shall\ manage\ publishing,\ releasing,\ sending,\ accepting\ and\ storing\ the\ data$ 

issue the registration

26. The digital platform service provider must apply for an extension of the registration before the expiration of the registration term, at least six months in advance, as per the specified conditions, if they wish to continue operating the business. 27. The department –

(a) can verify renewal of registration term in compliance with the relevant criteria and allow or refuse it.

- (b) refuse renewal of registration term, it shall not affect the remaining registration term.
- 28. The cybersecurity team must obtain the approval of the steering committee in line with the criteria, to carry out cybersecurity activities within the country without making a profit.

### Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

## Illegal goods, vehicles and timbers worth more than K335 million seized

THE Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee supervises activities of effective preventing illegal trade and trafficking of smuggled goods under the law.

On 2 January, duty-assigned combined teams under Magway Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force seized 0.712 tonne of illegal timber worth K119,779 in Konzaung Village of Pwintbyu Township. On 4 January, a combined team under the management of the Customs Department impounded one intermediate goods worth K265.611 million without documents from three containers at Thilawa Port.

In Kayin State, a squad confiscated intermediate goods and personal goods worth K10 million carried by a Doh Shwe Myanmar Light Truck valued at K25 million without any documentation at Yethaya temporary checkpoint.

Likewise, a combined team nabbed personal goods worth K10 million without any documents piled on roadside on Kengtung detour near Kengphaung Village in Kengtung.

At Nyaungkhashay X-ray checkpoint in Bago Region, officials seized illegal foodstuffs worth K2.2 million carried by a King Long bus worth K20 million. Moreover, 200 tonnes of illegal charcoal, 1.409 tonnes of teak, 0.537 tonne of hardwood and 1.944 tonnes of other timber worth K2.23 million were confiscated in Bago, Nyauglebin and Thayawady districts.

Authorities seized illegal intermediate goods, foodstuffs, personal goods and timbers approximately K335.161 million from 2 to 4 January and action was taken against offenders under the law. – MNA/TTA

**APPROXIMATELY 80 types** of marine products regularly enter the Kyimyindine Sanpya Fish Market in Yangon for domestic consumption and export. According to sources at the market, these products are exported via cold storage facilities to countries such as

From there, they are exported in containers via maritime routes. In some cases, foreign buyers come in person to place orders, while in others, agents handle the export process. Alongside marine fish, freshwater fishery products are also being exported.

days, marine products such as Bombay ducks, croakers, ribbonfish, and prawns destined for export have been consistently arriving from Myanmar's seas. As a result, sales of marine products are thriving during the New Year period. Additionally, fishery business owners predict that high-demand products such as hilsa and cuttlefish will enter the Yangon market in large quantities this month due to strong international demand. — Thitsa (MNA)/KZL

## Strict control of TB virus infection essential for public health

YANMAR is one of the 30 countries with the highest rates of tuberculosis (TB), TB/HIV co-infection, and drug-resistant TB globally. According to the World Health Organization's 2023 report on global TB trends, there are 475 TB cases per 100,000 people in Myanmar, with 80 per cent of those affected potentially losing their lives.

As such, the National TB Control Project, part of the Public Health Department under the Ministry of Health, collaborates with both internal and external partner organizations to implement

the project in line with the National Strategic Plan 2021-2025. Thanks to the efforts of health workers, over 120,000 TB patients received treatment in 2023, achieving an 88 per cent success rate in medical treatment.

Patients with TB disease need to begin medical treatment as soon as possible for effective recovery. TB is transmitted through the air when infected individuals cough, sneeze, or speak loudly. As a result, the disease can spread to family members, as well as in public places such as offices, schools, factories, and other shared spaces.

Moreover, individuals with nutritional deficiencies, weakened immune systems, those who smoke excessively or drink heavily, older adults, children under five, patients with a history of diabetes, kidney disease, or cancer, as well as people working in poorly lit or ventilated environments, and those living in poverty, are at a higher risk of contracting TB. Hence, individuals who

are experiencing symptoms of suspected TB should seek medical checkups. Government health units, along with private hospitals and clinics participating in the National TB Control Project, provide medical treatment to people with TB until they are free from the disease. Without proper medical treatment, TB can worsen, spreading from the lungs to other organs, leading to serious and unacceptable consequences.

In 2023, approximately 10.8 million people worldwide were infected with tuberculosis (TB), and 1.25 million patients lost their lives. According to the World Health Organization's TB-Free Strategy, efforts are underway to reduce the TB incidence rate by 50 per cent by 2025, compared to the number of cases in 2015. Moreover, the goal is to reduce the TB-related fatality rate by 75 per cent.

## **Global Trends: The Emergence of Smaller Regional Alliances in a Multipolar World** By HIa Myet Chell (International Law)

S the global geopolitical order evolves towards a more multipolar framework, one of the most significant developments is the proliferation of smaller regional coalitions. These alliances, characterized by their focused and often localized nature, are increasingly regarded as essential mechanisms for countries to protect their sovereignty, pursue shared economic and security objectives, and navigate the complexities of a rapidly transforming global power structure. While traditional global institutions such as the United Nations (UN) and the European Union (EU) continue to play important roles, the formation of these smaller, region-specific groupings is becoming a defining feature of modern international relations.

#### Transition to Multipolarity and the Rise of Focused Alliances

The world is gradually shifting away from a unipolar global system dominated by a singular superpower towards a more multipolar order, where several regional powers exert significant influence. The theoretical framework of structural realism, particularly as articulated by Kenneth Waltz, posits that in a multipolar environment, states are more inclined to form alliances based on shared security concerns and economic interests. Smaller, more targeted coalitions allow states to focus on pressing regional challenges – such as trade, security, climate change, and infrastructure - without being overshadowed by the rivalries between global superpowers. These compact alliances offer enhanced flexibility, allowing states to respond rapidly and effectively to immediate concerns. Southeast Asia: A Paradigm of **Regional Cooperation** 

Southeast Asia offers a compelling illustration of the rise of focused regional alliances. Strategically situated between the Indian and Pacific Oceans, the region has historically been a theater of geopolitical competition, particularly between the United States and China. Countries such as Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, and Thailand are compelled to balance economic partnerships with China while maintaining security ties with the United States, leading to a delicate diplomatic balancing act.

China's rapid economic ascendancy has led many Southeast Asian nations to strengthen their engagement with Beijing, particularly through initiatives like the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), which facilitates trade, infrastructure development, and investment. Nevertheless, these countries, despite their economic dependence on China, also maintain substantial security relationships with the US, as evidenced by longstanding agreements like the **US-Philippines Mutual Defence** Treaty and the US-Thailand Security Cooperation Agreement. These arrangements ensure a US military presence in the region, which serves as a counterweight to China's expanding influence.

To navigate this complex geopolitical terrain, many Southeast Asian countries have increasingly turned to smaller, more compact groups such as the Ayeyawady-Chao Phraya-Mekong Economic Cooperation Strategy (ACMECS) and the Cambodia-Laos-Vietnam Development Triangle Area (CLV-DTA). These alliances address specific regional issues, including infrastructure, trade, and security, allowing countries to collaborate on critical matters without becoming embroiled in the broader geopolitical rivalry between the US and China. The rise of such smaller associations underscores the region's preference for pragmatic, issue-based cooperation, rather than broad geopolitical alignment.

#### The Global Phenomenon of **Regional Alliances**

The trend towards the formation of smaller regional groups is not confined to Southeast Asia; it is a global phenomenon. Around the world, countries are increasingly opting for these coalitions to address regional challenges without being drawn into the larger, often destabilizing, power struggles between global superpowers.

#### Challenges

In Europe, smaller alliances have gained prominence as countries seek to assert their national interests, particularly in areas where broader EU policies may not align with their priorities. Notable examples include the Visegrád Group - comprising the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, and Slovakia-which has taken a more assertive stance on issues such as immigration and economic integration, challenging EU consensus. Likewise, the Nordic-Baltic Alliance, which includes Sweden, Finland, Denmark, and the Baltic states, focuses on security cooperation and regional stability in response to perceived threats,

particularly from Russia. These smaller groupings enable countries to address specific challenges in a more flexible and responsive manner, which is often not feasible within the larger, more bureaucratic EU framework. The emergence of such alliances reflects the growing desire for greater autonomy and adaptability in a rapidly changing geopolitical environment.

#### The Middle East: Fragmentation and Regional Realign-

In the Middle East, smaller alliances have emerged in response to longstanding regional power struggles, particularly between Saudi Arabia and Iran. The Abraham Accords, which saw Israel normalize diplomatic relations with the UAE, Bahrain, Sudan, and Morocco, represent a significant shift in the region's geopolitical landscape, fostering cooperation in areas such as security, trade, and political alignment. Similarly, the Arab Quartet, consisting of Saudi Arabia, the UAE, Bahrain, and Egypt, was formed to counter Qatar's growing regional influence and present a unified stance against perceived destabilizing forces.

These smaller groupings provide a mechanism for countries in the region to pursue specific geopolitical and economic interests, while mitigating the influence

#### of external powers, such as Iran and Turkive, which often play a disruptive role in regional affairs. **Africa: Regional Cooperation** as a Solution to Local Challenges

In Africa, smaller alliances such as the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) and the East African Community (EAC) have proven instrumental in addressing a range of local challenges, including conflict resolution, economic integration, and trade facilitation. These regional organizations allow member states to collaborate on security issues, promote economic growth, and manage natural resources effectively, offering solutions that are more tailored to local contexts than broader global organizations might provide.

Given the political instability, terrorism, and economic challenges facing many African states, these smaller alliances are increasingly viewed as essential for addressing the region's most pressing concerns.

#### Latin America: Fragmented Alliances in a Politically Diverse Region

In Latin America, political fragmentation has led to the formation of smaller alliances that reflect the region's diverse political landscape. The Pacific Alliance, which includes Chile, Colombia, Mexico, and Peru, is primarily focused on economic integration and trade, while the Bolivarian Alliance for the Peoples of Our America (ALBA), which includes Venezuela and Bolivia, espouses anti-imperialist and socialist ideals. These groupings allow countries to pursue their respective political and economic goals, providing platforms for cooperation amid the region's political fragmentation. Asia-Pacific: Strategic Partner-

#### ships and Balancing Global Powers

In the Asia-Pacific, smaller alliances are increasingly common, as countries seek to balance relations with both regional powers and global superpowers. The Quad (United States, Japan, India, and Australia), for example, is a strategic alignment designed to promote a free and open Indo-Pacific, particularly in response to China's growing influence. Additionally, regional organizations such as the South Pacific Islands Forum provide smaller Pacific island nations with a platform to collaborate on issues such as climate change. security, and sustainable development, while managing their relationships with global powers like the US, China, and Australia. The Promise and Perils of **Smaller Alliances** 

The formation of smaller regional alliances offers significant advantages, as well as notable risks. From the perspectives of international political economy and realist theory, these alliances provide countries with the opportunity to assert their autonomy and pursue specific economic, political, or security goals without being constrained by larger, more bureaucratic organizations. They facilitate faster decision-making and more effective responses to regional challenges

However, smaller pacts are not without their drawbacks. One of the primary concerns is the potential for regional instability. These groupings can become arenas for great power competition, particularly when external powers use them to counterbalance each other's influence. Furthermore, smaller alliances may struggle to maintain cohesion over time, especially when member states have divergent priorities. This lack of unity can limit the effectiveness of these groupings in addressing long-term regional issues. Moreover, such alliances may marginalize countries that are excluded, leading to feelings of exclusion and inequality.

#### **Conclusion: Smaller Region**al Alliances as Catalysts in a Multipolar Global Order

The rise of smaller regional alliances is a defining feature of the emerging multipolar world order. Countries are increasingly turning to focused coalitions to address regional issues and safeguard their national interests. While these alliances present valuable opportunities for cooperation, they also carry risks of fragmentation, instability, and external interference. As the global geopolitical environment continues to evolve, smaller regional groups will play a critical role in shaping future international relations. Nations

will need to navigate the delicate balance between cooperation and competition within these groupings to effectively manage the complexities of the modern world

# FDA to regulate production, distribution of blended oil

THE Food and Drug Administration under the Ministry of Health will check blended oil to ensure food safety for the consumers.

The rules regarding production, storage, transport and distribution of the blended oil were announced on 29 March 2024. The blended vegetable oil must be a mixture of only two types of oil containing 40 per cent of vegetable oil. They are prohibited to add artificial flavour, animal oil and raw cotton seed oil.

Oil crops such as peanut,

sesame, sunflower, niger and oil palm are cultivated in the country. Some locally produced blended oil of inferior quality are found in the market. Thus, FDA will combat those low-quality cooking oil containing harmful substances to ensure food safety for the consumers.

Myanmar has a growing demand of 1.1 million tonnes of cooking oil per year. Beyond domestic production, about 900,000 tonnes of oil are yearly imported. — ASH/KK

# Authorities arrest Together Urban Force terrorist group along with weapons

Their aim is to destabilize the state, instill fear in the public, and undermine government institutions.

On the afternoon of 22 December 2024, a Tatmadaw officer returning from PyinOoLwin on leave attended his younger brother's wedding at the Apollo Hotel on Upper Baho Road, Ward 2, Mayangon Township. While returning by car with his younger sister, two terrorists shot him three times with a pistol in front of the hotel and then fled. The officer sustained a puncture wound to his right forearm (not serious), and his younger sister sustained a wound to her left thigh (also not serious).

In connection with the above incident, efforts were made to identify and arrest the suspects. Based on information provided by the public, who did not want further violence, the security team arrested the following individuals on the morning of 29 December: Moe Htet Aung (aka Moe Htet, aka Tein Nyo), Naing Win Latt, Khine Min Soe (aka Nyein Khant Lin, aka Papilon), Than Aung, and Cho Mar Lwin (Moe Htet Aung's parents). They were arrested at the Super Power Ko Mon Lay car workshop, located in the precinct of the Yadana Theingkha Monastery on Insein Road, West Gyogon Ward, Insein Township. During the arrest, authorities seized 500 detonators, one roll of gunpowder (200 feet), 0.5 viss of nitro kalazine, one homemade bomb, three visses of mixed gunpowder, 50 visses of pearls, and 0.2 viss of black powder.

According to the statements of the arrestees, it was learned that weapons and ammunition were being stored inside the Yadana Theingkha Monastery. A search

was conducted, and a 0.38 Special revolver, 25 rounds of ammunition, two TNT cartridges, 35 detonators, 0.5 viss of pink gunpowder, and other explosive materials were seized from a room on the second floor of the Ananta Gonyi Monastery.

Further investigation revealed that the weapons and ammunition used in the crime were found in the possession of suspects Swan Htet (aka Aaron) and Zun Pwint Phyu, who lived at No 528 (ground floor), U Kaung Street, Kayin Amyotha Ward, Kyimyindine Township. A search was conducted for them, but the suspects fled. Khin Yu Swe, the mother of Swan Htet (aka Aaron), was arrested in the kitchen of her home, where authorities seized two Sig Sauer pistols, three magazines, 15 rounds of 9mm Thai Arms ammunition, 9 rounds of 9mm Luger ammunition, and one homemade bomb. Following the testimony of Moe Htet Aung, Htet Aung Hlaing was arrested near the entrance to the railway diesel locomotive factory on Baho Street, Insein Township, on the afternoon of 2 January.

A total of seven individuals—five males and two females—who were involved in terrorist activities in Yangon Region, were arrested along with two Sig Sauer pistols, three magazines, 24 rounds of 9mm ammunition, one 0.38 Special revolver, 25 rounds of ammunition, two homemade bombs, two TNT cartridges, 535 detonators, 3.5 visses of gunpowder, 0.5 viss of nitrochlorine, 50 visses of pearls, 0.2 viss of black powder, one roll of gunpowder (200 feet), and explosive accessories.

The investigation revealed that the terrorist group called Together Urban Force was initially formed by Khine Min Soe and consisted of five members: Moe Htet Aung, Naing Win Latt, and the remaining suspects, Swan Htet (aka Aaron) and Zun Pwint Phyu in addition to other remaining suspects.

The terrorist group, Together Urban Force, under the command of Ko Myo (aka Sayar Kyaung, aka U Lay Gyi), carried out six bombings and two unprovoked assassinations in public places with the aim of undermining the State's governance and instilling fear among innocent people. — MNA

## **Myanmar imports 1.4M tonnes of fertilizers, over 26,000 tonnes of pesticides in Apr-Dec**

MYANMAR brought in over 1.4 million tonnes of fertilizers in the past nine months of the current financial year 2024-2025 beginning 1 April, according to the Urea Fertilizer Purchasing and Distribution Steering Committee.

Union Minister for Cooperatives and Rural Development U Hla Moe who chaired the committee stated that the committee will continue evaluating and recommending import of the remaining fertilizers and pesticides.

Myanmar Fertilizer, Seed and Pesticide Entrepreneurs Association (MFSPEA) must monitor each company whether they can import as per the set import volume or not. The permit should be granted to only those companies that can actually and completely import them, he added.

The steering committee is asked to govern shops in each region and state if they follow the set reference prices of fertilizers after adding transport cost and set profit margin, to report overcharging, to monitor market manipulation with stocks piled up and to cooperate with the officials concerned and the relevant departments. The Union minister also addressed the departments concerned to ensure no delay in import of agricultural inputs, quality assurance and price fairness.

At present, the Fertilizer Committee holds a quarterly meeting to ensure quality fertilizers for growers without facing shortages. Under the approval of Fertilizer Technology Group, 11,573 fertilizer registrations

## YSX stock trading value exceeds K466M in Dec

THE grand trading value of the eight listed companies on the Yangon Stock Exchange (YSX) reached hit over K466 million with 132,866 shares in December 2024, according to the monthly report released by the exchange.

At present, shares of eight listed companies - First Myanmar Investment (FMI), Myanmar Thilawa SEZ Holdings (MTSH), Myanmar Citizens Bank (MCB), First Private Bank (FPB), TMH Telecom Public Co Ltd (TMH), the Ever Flow River Group Public Co Ltd (EFR), Amata Holding Public Co Ltd. (AMATA) and Myanmar Agro Exchange Public Co Ltd (MAEX) are traded in the security market.

FMI topped the trading with 19,092 shares worth K157.7 million, followed by 33,007 shares of MTSH worth over K104.49 million, 19,982 shares of MAEX worth over K62.95 million, 30,692 shares of FPB worth over K59.71 million, 18,281 shares of EFR worth K30.87 million, 5,705 shares of AMATA worth over \$25.03 million, 4,778 shares of TMH worth over K14.48 million and 1,329 shares of MCB worth over K10.84 million respectively last month.

## CBM sells over 510,000 yuan on 3 Jan

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) injected over 510,000 yuan on 3 January after sales of US\$25 million, over 670,000 yuan and 2.45 million baht on 2 January.

CBM pumped \$144 million, 321 million baht and over 12 million yuan in December 2024, over \$59 million, over 280 million baht and 8.78 million yuan in November and over \$91 million, over 610 million baht and 9.8 million yuan in October into the financial market.

CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and the currency

devaluation.

According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been joining hands with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK

## **Russia's Rosatom to sue Siemens for failure to deliver prepaid equipment**

Siemens' refusal to deliver the manufactured equipment led to additional costs and delays for Rosatom.

RUSSIAN state nuclear corporation Rosatom will file a lawsuit against German company Siemens over its failure to deliver the prepaid equipment for unit 1 of the Akkuyu nuclear power plant (NPP) Rosatom is building in Turkiye, CEO Alexey Likhachev said on Saturday.

Siemens "demonstratively refused" to deliver the equipment that had already been manufactured and paid for, Likhachev said in an interview with the Rossiya 24 broadcaster:

"There will obviously be court proceedings. The prepaid equipment was not delivered. This resulted in additional costs for us as we had to purchase the equipment elsewhere and adjust the installation deadlines. These claims will be made," he said.

Russian Deputy Prime Minister Alexander Novak announced in October that Germany's Siemens Energy had violated its contractual obligations to supply switchgear equipment to the first unit of Akkuyu NPP. The replacement was promptly found and reordered from friendly countries. The Russian and Turkish sides jointly assess how the situation has affected the realization of the project, director of construction and production organization at Akkuyu Nuclear Denis Sezemin said. # Nehammer says will resign as Austrian Chancellor after coalition talks collapse

Despite efforts to form new coalitions, negotiations with the Freedom Party and others ended in failure.

AUSTRIAN Chancellor Karl Nehammer said on Saturday he would resign from his positions as the country's leader and the head of the Austrian People's Party (OVP) after coalition talks collapsed.

Nehammer said that it was not possible to reach an agreement during coalition negotiations between his OVP party and the Social Democrats.

"I will resign as the federal chancellor and OVP chair in the coming days," Nehammer said in a statement.

The Austrian leader added that it had been an honor for him to serve his country as chancellor and as interior minister before that. Austria's political future has been in limbo since September's parliamentary elections, where the populist anti-mass immigration, anti-Brussels, pro-neutrality, anti-Ukraine conflict Freedom Party of Austria (FPO) nearly doubled its standing, garnering over 29 per cent of the vote and causing Nehammer's ruling People's Party/ Green coalition to lose its parliamentary majority.

Nehammer refused to form a coalition with the Freedom Party, and has sought to cobble together a new government with the New Austria and Liberal Forum (NEOS) and the SPOe, respectively, with both attempts ending in failure. — SPUTNIK

## **China's largest offshore solar-hydrogen farm starts operation**

It integrates photovoltaic power generation, hydrogen production, refueling, and energy storage.

LARGE integrated solar-hydrogen farm, located in the tidal flat area of eastern China, has officially commenced operations, according to its owner, Guohua Energy Investment Co., Ltd., under the CHN Energy Investment Group (CHN Energy).

The largest of its kind in China, the energy farm is officially known as the Rudong offshore photovoltaic-hydrogen energy storage project. It has been successfully connected to the grid and began operations on 31 December 2024, in Rudong county, Jiangsu province, CHN Energy said in a press release on Friday.

This marks the launch of China's first comprehensive energy utilization and coastal ecological management project, integrating photovoltaic power generation, hydrogen production, hydrogen refueling and energy storage, according to the press release.

With a total installed capacity of 400 megawatts, the Rudong project, spanning 4,300 mu (about 287 hectares), features a newly constructed 220 kV onshore booster station, a 60 MW/120 MWh energy storage facility, and a hydrogen production and refueling station with a production capacity of 1,500 standard cubic metres per hour and hydrogen refueling capability of 500 kilogrammes per day. Once fully operational in 2025, the project is expected to generate an average of 468 million kilowatt-hours of electricity annually, equivalent to saving approximately 151,000 tonnes of standard coal each year. — Xinhua
