

SAC Vice-Chairman Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win inspects earthquake-affected Pyinmana Myoma Market 1, Institute of Agriculture and Livestock Breeding

Vice-Chairman of the State Administration Council Deputy Prime Minister, Vice-Senior General Soe Win, who is also Chairman of the National Disaster Management Committee, inspected the damage to the No 1 Myoma Market in Pyinmana and the Institute of Agriculture and Livestock Breeding caused by the earthquake in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area yesterday afternoon.

At the No 1 Myoma Market in Pyinmana, the Vice-Senior General viewed efforts of Tatmadaw members and volunteers in clearing debris at collapsed A and B complexes caused by the Mandalay earthquake and aftershocks, and conditions of slightly impacted C and D complexes of the market and gave instructions to officials.

The market was built in 1995 on 4.375

acres of land. It was formed with four market complexes comprising 1,369 shops. The recent earthquake destroyed 393 shops in A and B complexes. Shops from slightly damaged C and D complexes are allowed to continue sales of goods without tax. During the period when the Myoma market is being rebuilt, a temporary market is being allowed at the Aungmyingala yard near the Yangon-Mandalay Highway in Pyinmana Township.

At the Institute of Agriculture and Livestock Breeding in Shwechi Ward of Pyinmana, the Vice-Senior General heard reports by Union Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Min Naung on the damage to historic buildings and other buildings caused by the earthquake in the compound of the institute.

The Vice-Senior General viewed

round damaged buildings, namely: the Agricultural Machinery building (cetenary building), the principal's office, Karamat Hall, the guesthouse, Yinma Hall, Tharaphi Hall, Shwe Yaung Chi Hall and lecture halls.

He instructed officials to rebuild the damaged lecture halls in original states, conduct soil tests before reconstruction, and examine the conditions of slightly damaged buildings and staff housing for repairs in cooperation with officials and experts before opening of the institute in June, and systematically keep important documents and teaching aids.

The Vice-Senior General gave words of encouragement to the principal, teachers, staff and families of the institute. As teachers and staff families reported on their requirements, the Vice-Senior Gen-

eral pledged to provide basic foodstuffs for families for one month and to build modular houses as the temporary school office and staff housing for convenient accommodation.

The institute is composed of 92 buildings. Of them, five ancient buildings and three others, totalling eight, were destroyed by the earthquake. Moreover, one ancient building and four other structures were damaged at dangerous level. Currently, the institute requires lecture halls for 461 students from the first to third year courses.

The agricultural machinery department office (cetenary building) is a venue where students were taught in welding, mortar repairing, blacksmithing and wood works after the institute was established in 1923. — MNA/TTA

NPT National Museum confirms no earthquake damage to modern history exhibits

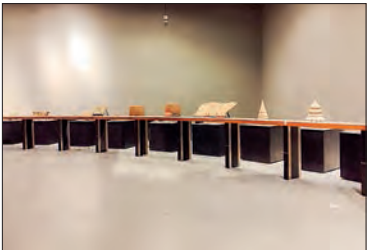
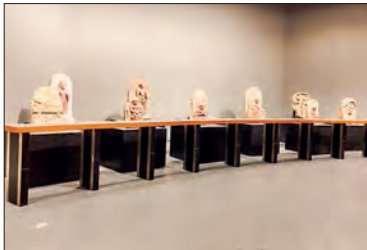
THE National Museum (Nay Pyi Taw) has stated on its Facebook page that gallery exhibits and displays in the Historical Period (11th-14th century AD) have not been damaged.

It is one of the two national museums in Myanmar and is located near the Kumudra Lotus Circle, Rajasingaha Road, Ottarathiri Township, Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory.

The National Museum (Nay Pyi Taw) had announced that it would be closed until further notice due to the damage caused

by the Mandalay earthquake that struck on 28 March.

“The exhibition was properly organized, so the main exhibition items in the Historical Period (11th-14th century AD) gallery, including the replicas of the pagodas, sandstone statues, the three iconic pagodas of Bagan, and the dome that displays a panoramic view of Bagan, were not damaged by the Mandalay earthquake,” the statement said, along with recent photos. — Htet Oo Maung/ZN

Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

Aid flows as Myanmar quake toll hits 3,759

A powerful earthquake struck Myanmar on 28 March, severely striking six regions and states. As of 23 April, the disaster has caused the deaths of 3,759 people and injuries to 5,107 others, with 114 individuals still reported missing.

Search and rescue operations are ongoing, led by the Myanmar Fire Brigade along with both local and international rescue teams. They continue to reach the affected areas in time and have successfully rescued 653 people alive from collapsed buildings. They have also recovered the bodies of 767 people.

Local and international donors are contributing money and relief materials to assist those affected by the earthquake. Between 7 pm on 22 April and 5 pm on 23 April, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) Myanmar delivered 10.96 tonnes of aid, including tarpaulins and water purification tablets, to the Yangon International Airport.

Meanwhile, Shenzhen Salubris Pharmaceuticals Company Limited of China, through the China-Myanmar Economic Cooperation and Development Promotion Association, dispatched 2.004 tonnes of medical supplies to the Ministry of Health and Mandalay General Hospital.

These relief items are reaching the hands of affected people as quickly as possible. — MNA/KZL

Just 273 mobile communication stations await repairs

THE Mandalay earthquake that occurred on 28 March destroyed 6,730 mobile communication stations, and maintenance works were conducted. As of 22 April, 6,457 stations have restored their communication services, and only 273 stations remain to be repaired across the nation – 88 MPT stations, 115 ATOM stations, 49 Ooredoo stations and 21 Mytel stations. — MNA/KTZH

Max Cement Taungphila slashes bag prices to K20,000

THE Max Cement Taungphila cement factory produces 1,500-1,800 tonnes of cement daily to ensure the reconstruction processes in quake-stricken areas. The factory also reduced the prices yesterday for the people to be able to purchase it at cheap prices and to conduct the rehabilitation processes more effectively. The price of cement that was sold at K20,000 per bag for public buildings and ministerial buildings was reduced to K17,500 per bag, while K23,000 per bag for the reconstruction of the houses of quake victims became K20,000 per bag. The factory reduces the prices, aiming to use the cement at affordable prices in repairing the schools, governmental buildings and public buildings and re-

constructing the buildings before the monsoon period, according to an official of the factory. While the prices are being reduced, systematic monitoring and inspections are being carried out during production to ensure the manufacturing, distribution, and quality aspects, and to guarantee that consumers receive the products systematically. — Mya Nanda/KTZH

Yangon Region surpasses summer paddy cultivation goals

CULTIVATION of summer paddy covered 267,078 acres in Yangon Region, exceeding the target of 250,896 acres for this season. Summer paddy cultivation outperformed by 16,182 acres against those sowing acres recorded last year.

A total of 267,078 acres of summer paddy were cultivated in Yangon Region, and 113,715 of them have been harvested as of the third week of April, according to the Department of Agriculture in Yangon Region.

The remaining acres of 153,363 are being harvested. The average paddy yield this summer is 93.47 per cent per acre.

The department provided

8,000 drum seeders in the respective townships to establish

systematic agriculture and promote uniform crop growth. In

2024, 85,726 acres were sown under the seeder system. The

effective sowing under the seeder system reached 106,005 acres in 2025.

Although there was light rainfall in certain areas in the region starting from the pre-Thingyan Festival, it did not have an impact on the summer paddy harvest.

Moreover, the department is assisting the farmers in ploughing and cultivating flax plants as green manure to enrich the soil, treat farmland and improve soil health and fertility. The summer paddy fields can be found in eight districts of the region, including Twantay District, with 91,197 acres of summer paddy. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/EM

Potato harvest resumes in Naungtaya, bringing optimism to farmers

In Naungtaya, the harvest of potatoes has now commenced, and the production has been promising, making farmers happy, said an official from the Naungtaya Potato Association.

Potato demand has been normal, and at present, potatoes are already being yielded in Heho, he said.

“The market demand has been normal. It is the nature of the market that the price will fall if the production is in surplus, or the price will rise if the production is low. This year, the production seems promising

at the beginning of the harvest time because the weather is not bad,” he said.

The potato price climbed up slightly during the Thingyan and post-Thingyan period, however, it has now returned to normal. It is expected that the price will fall a little in May and June when the production is peak and will rise up again in July, August and September when the supply is limited, he added.

In Naungtaya, potatoes are grown in three rounds- first in June, second in August and third in December and January yearly. — MT/ZS

Cardinal Charles Bo leads Yangon memorial for Pope Francis at St Mary’s Cathedral

A prayer service for Pope Francis, who passed away on 21 April, was held on the afternoon of 22 April at Saint Mary’s Cathedral in Yangon.

The ceremony was led by Cardinal Charles Bo, head of the Catholic Church in Myanmar and Archbishop of Yangon, along with Catholic clergies who offered prayers for the late Pope. Catholic devotees, as well as ambassadors and officials from South Korea, Brazil, Timor-Leste, Switzerland, Italy, the United Kingdom, Indonesia, the Philippines, and Israel, were also in attendance.

At the Jubilee Door of Saint Mary’s Cathedral, where the prayer service was held, a space was arranged for mourners to lay wreath tributes in memory of the Pope. A condolence book was also

sions about Myanmar,” said Cardinal Charles Bo. “Though I am deeply saddened, I truly believe that he is now free from suffering and has found peace.”

Upon the death or resignation of a Pope, the Vatican begins a formal mourning period followed by the Conclave – a secret ballot through which a new Pope is elected. The candidate who receives the highest number of votes will assume the papal office.

It is reported that Cardinal Charles Bo, Archbishop of Yangon and President of the Federation of Asian Bishops’ Conferences, is among the 15 cardinals eligible to be considered for the papacy. He remains the first and only Cardinal from Myanmar. — ASH/KNN

A total of 1,727 Myanmar food processing companies and factories have submitted 3,583 applications to the General Administration of Customs of the People's Republic of China (GACC) as of 11 April 2025, according to the Domestic Trade Division (GACC team) of the Myanmar Trade Promotion Organization under the Ministry of Commerce. According to GACC Decrees 248 and 249, GACC registration is mandatory for food exporters starting from 1 January 2022.

Those individuals executing edible oil, oilseeds, stuffed pastry products, edible bird's nest and related products, edible grains, grains milling industrial products and malt, fresh and dehydrated vegetables, dried beans, plant species, nuts and seeds, dried fruits, unroasted coffee and cocoa bean, special dietary food excluding milk-based formula, functional foods, bee products, aquatic products including farm products, animal products and animal feed and livestock animal businesses need to apply for GACC licence to place their goods in China's market.

The relevant authorities for

the registration with GACC are the Agriculture Department, the Livestock Breeding and Veterinary Department, the Fisheries Department and the Food and Drug Administration Department.

Exporters can directly access the China International Trade Single Window through [https://](https://cifer.singlewindow.cn)

cifer.singlewindow.cn by creating accounts for those food groups which are not listed on the aforementioned 18 groups.

Between 1 December 2021 and 11 April 2025, 3,583 applications by 1,727 factories have been forwarded to the GACC through the Agriculture Department (3,411 applications), the Fisher-

ies Department (149), the Livestock Breeding and Veterinary Department (14) and the Food and Drug Administration Department (nine).

Regarding the registration of the importing companies, the Department of Animal and Plant Quarantine under the GACC will check quarantine access for the

imported grains (unroasted coffee beans, cocoa beans, fresh and dehydrated vegetables, plant seasonings (plant spices), edible grain, dried beans, oil seeds (oil plant) and herbal animal products and plant for their origins.

The companies cannot directly proceed with registration and they need to carry out this step through competent authorities and departments concerned by sending email via dapq@customs.gov.cn or submitting a letter to the Chinese Embassy to Myanmar or Myanmar Embassy to China.

As of 11 April 2025, a total of 1,092 applications have been successful in registering with the GACC with the approval of the competent authority. Additionally, a manual registration list of overseas manufacturers of imported foods with the GACC as of 25 September 2024 has been uploaded on <http://dzs.customs.gov.cn/>. CBM to infuse US\$25M into fuel oil industry

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) announced on 22 April that it would pump US\$25 million into the fuel oil sector. CBM sold over \$319,900 and 106,080 baht on that day as well.

CBM also declared to sell \$55 million to those engaged in the fuel oil industry.

CBM sold almost \$1.9 million on 10 April. CBM announced on 7 April that it would pump \$30 million into the fuel oil industry, and after that, it sold \$40 million and over six

million baht on that day.

CBM injected 500,000 yuan on 4 April and over 2.35 million baht on 3 April into the market.

CBM injected over \$126 million, 320 million baht and 3.6 million yuan in March, over \$88 million, 7.5 million yuan and 161 million baht in February and \$124 million, over 13.8 million baht and over 4.8 million yuan in January. CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and currency deval-

uation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been collaborating with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate, depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK

Fisheries Dept alerts fish farmers to extreme heat risks

THE Department of Fisheries under the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation notified fish farmers to protect fish from scorching heat.

Summer heat is hazardous to fish ponds as they increase evaporation and lower water levels. Moreover, uneaten feed, faeces and metabolic wastes can pollute pond water. It can make fish more susceptible to disease. Therefore, fish farmers are advised to provide fish with appropriate amounts of feed and supplements to maintain water quality.

Furthermore, cloudy days and low temperatures in winter limit sunlight penetration and deplete oxygen levels, so fish are seen lingering at the water surface. Increasing water movement, adding an air pump and an aeration device, or creating wave movements are required to increase oxygen levels in fish ponds.

Afterwards, the department stated fish pond man-

agement measures during extreme heat, including adding clean water into the ponds, controlling fish populations, avoiding changing fish ponds, maintaining water quality (25-40 centimetres) for an intensive fish culture system, doing elbow test in which you submerge your arms into the water up to elbow and visibility to your palm must not clear nor be dark. Treating algae directly must be avoided. A balanced diet with the right nutrients at appropriate feeding frequency and in the correct amount is crucial as well.

Pond fish need clean water to thrive, so the farmers must get rid of uneaten feed from the pond. Additionally, pond fish culture requires a reserved water supply. Observing the fish ponds and water quality must be undertaken at 6 am every day. They are advised to inform of any suspicious changes in the fish pond to the nearest department. — NN/KK

Protect marine biodiversity for environmental conservation

HUMAN survival depends on healthy ecosystems that provide food, clean water, and climate regulation. However, biodiversity loss is accelerating at an alarming rate. With oceans covering 70 per cent of the Earth’s surface, protecting marine biodiversity is crucial for global sustainability.

Oceans have supported life for over three billion years and provide more than 50 per cent of the world’s food. Nearly 90 per cent of fish stocks remain untapped in deep waters beyond 200 miles offshore. As the planet’s largest ecosystem, oceans sustain millions of livelihoods of the global people to produce marine products while helping regulate climate conditions. Unfortunately, marine environments are now in crisis.

Pollution and overfishing severely damage marine life and coral reefs. Large-scale commercial fishing, driven by advanced technology, disrupts underwater ecosystems, leading to “ocean desertification.” According to the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), nearly 80 per cent of global fish stocks are depleted due to excessive fishing.

Plastic waste is another major threat, accounting for 60 per cent of ocean pollution. Microplastics contaminate marine food chains, affecting species from tiny plankton to massive whales. The presence of plastics in water bodies poses a long-term danger to aquatic life and ecosystems. Furthermore, climate change reduces oceanic oxygen levels, endangering marine species. Despite United Nations initiatives to restore ocean health, success remains limited due to some nations’ excessive exploitation of marine resources

and reckless waste disposal.

All global people are responsible for protecting marine biodiversity to save the oceans as well as lessen environmental degradation in cooperation with relevant authorities and governments. Humans cannot live alone. All living beings from land and water have to live together while enjoying the fruits of environmental improvement. As such, they have to conserve the oceans as their habitats. Their lifestyle should not harm anyone in addition to anything else. They all have a concept that their activities can save their life while giving healthy oceans to new generations. Otherwise, they will lose their homes.

The combined impact of human activities and environmental changes weakens ecosystems, threatening marine biodiversity, wildlife, and forests. Without urgent intervention, both land and aquatic life will suffer irreversible damage. Governments must enhance public awareness, enforce strict regulations, and penalize irresponsible industries contributing to environmental degradation. Only through collective action can everybody ensure the sustainability of marine biodiversity and protect the natural world.

Shattered Cities, But Unbroken Spirit

ON 28 March 2025, a 7.7-magnitude earthquake rocked central Myanmar, carving a path of destruction through cities like Mandalay, Sagaing, Nay Pyi Taw, Yamethin, Kyaukse, Inlay, Amarapura, etc. Recognized globally as a catastrophic event, it claimed thousands of lives, obliterated homes, and shattered infrastructure. Ten days on, efforts to clear debris dominate, as the sheer scale of devastation hinders the shift to rebuilding. Here, I would like to examine the ongoing recovery, exploring the positive and negative impacts of debris clearance, strategies for physical and mental rehabilitation, the effectiveness of international aid, preparations for future disasters with Japan as a model, and the unyielding human spirit that persists against nature’s wrath.

Debris Clearance:

Clearing rubble from collapsed structures, roads, and public spaces is the immediate focus, a task that reveals both progress and persistent challenges.

Debris clearance has sparked remarkable community solidarity. In Mandalay, volunteers – students, monks, and shopkeepers – work alongside survivors, using shovels and bare hands to reclaim streets. This collective effort has reopened access to hospitals and markets, restoring fragments of normalcy. In Sagaing, a youth-led initiative salvaged bricks and wood to build temporary shelters, showcasing ingenuity amid scarcity. These efforts have also uncovered survivors, like a child rescued after five days in Nay Pyi Taw, fueling hope. Local businesses, despite losses, have donated food and tools, reinforcing social bonds and proving that crises can unite even divided communities.

Yet, the process is agonizingly slow. The shortage of heavy machinery, exacerbated by Myanmar’s economic con-

straints, leaves high-rise ruins in Mandalay and Naypyidaw as dangerous obstacles. Unstable structures collapse unpredictably, endangering workers – reports indicate at least ten injuries during clearance in Amarapura. Coordination gaps persist; in Yamethin, multiple groups cleared the same site while others were neglected. Environmental risks loom large: improper debris disposal threatens water sources, especially with monsoons nearing. The emotional weight is heavier still. Uncovering bodies amid the rubble forces families to confront loss repeatedly, deepening trauma in communities already stretched thin by grief and displacement.

Physical and Mental Rehabilitation

Restoring Myanmar’s affected regions demands a dual focus on physical infrastructure and mental well-being to rebuild

lives holistically.

Physically, the priority is safe housing, healthcare, and economic recovery. Temporary shelters, built with earthquake-resistant designs, are critical to protect survivors from aftershocks and seasonal rains. In Sagaing, bamboo-based shelters have proven cost-effective, but scaling this model requires funding and expertise. Healthcare systems, long underfunded, need mobile clinics to treat injuries, infections, and chronic illnesses worsened by displacement. For instance, diabetes patients in Mandalay have struggled without access to insulin. Economic recovery hinges on livelihoods – cash-for-work programmes can engage survivors in rebuilding efforts, while agricultural aid, like seeds and irrigation support, can revive farming. Long-term, urban planning must prioritize resilient infrastructure, such as retrofitted schools and bridges,



to prevent future collapses.

Mentally, the earthquake has left scars that may outlast physical ruins. Grief, fear, and uncertainty grip survivors, compounded by Myanmar’s ongoing conflict. Community-led mental health initiatives are vital, with local leaders and monks offering counselling in familiar settings. In Amarapura, a temple has become a hub for support groups, where survivors share stories and find solace. remote Yamethin. These efforts have stabilized urban areas, preventing disease outbreaks and mass starvation.

Limitations

However, the aid’s reach is uneven. The authorities’ tight control has sparked accusations of aid diversion, with reports of supplies stockpiled in the strongholds while some of the areas starve. In Sagaing’s rural pockets, damaged roads and communication blackouts delay deliveries – some villages waited a week for help. Funding remains a bottleneck; the UN’s \$1.2 billion appeal is only 30 per cent funded, limiting long-term aid. Geopolitical shifts have reduced Western contributions – US sanctions and domestic priorities have slashed its role, leaving regional donors overstretched. Cultural misunderstandings also hinder efforts; for instance, unfamiliar food aid has been underutilized in some communities. While impactful in parts, aid must navigate these hurdles to achieve equity and sustainability.

Preparing for Future Disasters

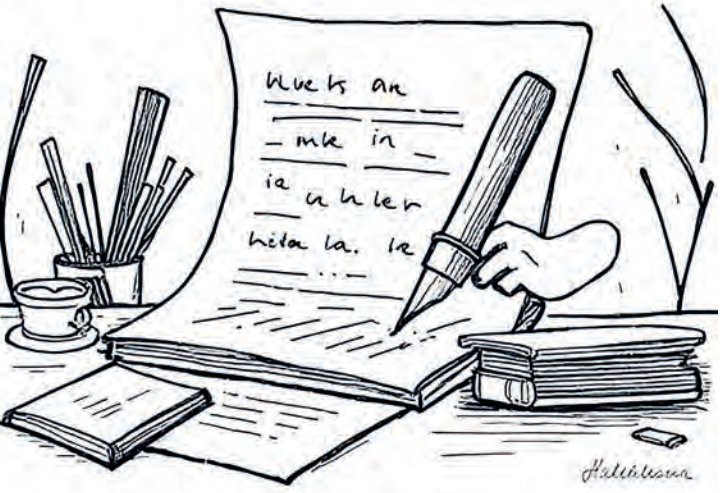
Myanmar’s exposure to earthquakes and floods demands robust preparedness. Japan’s disaster-ready framework offers actionable lessons for individuals and authorities.

Individual Preparedness

Citizens must adopt proactive habits. Japan’s households maintain emergency kits with food, water, and first-aid supplies for 72 hours – Myanmar could adopt this, prioritizing rice, candles, and portable stoves suited to local needs. Community drills, like Japan’s September 1 simulations, teach evacuation and safety protocols. In Yamethin, village-level exercises could identify safe zones and train residents in basic rescue. Awareness campaigns via radio and pagodas can emphasize securing furniture and avoiding unsafe buildings. In Naypyidaw, a post-quake initiative taught 1,000 families to anchor shelves, a small but replicable step. Financial preparedness, like Japan’s micro-insurance schemes, could cushion economic shocks if tailored to Myanmar’s informal economy.

Myanmar extradites 3 undocumented Malawians

MYANMAR deported three Malawians for their involvement in telecom fraud and destructive actions via the Myanmar-Thailand Friendship Bridge II yesterday. Myanmar authorities officially handed over the deportees and the necessary legal documents to ensure their smooth repatriation.

Between 30 January and 23 April 2025, a total of 9,032 illegal immigrants were identified and detained in Myanmar. Of this number, 7,311 individuals have already been deported through Thailand to their respective countries, while arrangements are being made to deport the remaining 1,720 individuals. These individuals are currently under detention while awaiting repatriation.

The government is strictly cracking down on online scams and online gambling by cooperating with other countries, including neighbouring countries, especially through the Myanmar-China-Thailand Trilateral Cooperation, and systematically transferring the foreigners involved in these operations. — MNA/KTZH

Drugs seized in Mohnyin and North Okkalapa

A combined team comprising members of the Anti-Drug Police Force searched a Mitsubishi Canter driven by Saw Tha Htoo, accompanied by Saw Naing, near Nantsiaung Village in Panglong Village-tract, Mohnyin Township, at 6 pm on 21 April. The police seized 43.5 kilogrammes of opium extract worth K60.9 million and 35 kilogrammes of raw opium valued at K42 million.

Additionally, the police searched a package belonging to Ma Lei Zarli Htay at a bus station in North Okkalapa Township at 3 pm on 21 April and seized 48,000 stimulant tablets valued at K48 million. The offenders are being prosecuted under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law. — MNA/MKKS

Foreign tourists must register online before entering Thailand

Oscar voters required to view all films before casting ballots

OSCAR voters will soon have to prove they have watched every nominated film in a category before casting their final ballots, the Academy announced, tightening rules to ensure more informed voting ahead of the 2026 ceremony.

Oscar voters will be required to demonstrate that they have watched all the films in each category before they cast their final ballots, the Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences announced Monday.

The new rule, which addresses a longstanding concern that voters are skipping some films, will apply for the next Oscars ceremony in March 2026, the Academy said in a statement.

The Academy previously operated under an honour system that voters would see every Oscar-nominated film before casting their ballots.

However, with the number of nominees growing in recent years, some voters have admitted not fully fulfilling that duty.

Under the new system, Academy members will be tracked on the organization's voters-only streaming platform to make sure they have watched each film.

For movies seen elsewhere, such as in cinemas or at festival screenings, voters will be required to "fill out a form" vouching for when and where it was watched, according to the Hollywood Reporter.

For the Best Picture category alone, which has 10 nominated films, competing studios traditionally host glitzy events to woo voters during their awards campaigns, with parties, screenings and festival showings, sometimes followed by Q&A sessions with the stars and filmmakers. — AFP

Government Responsibility

Authorities must build systemic resilience. Japan's stringent building codes, mandating quake-proof designs, prevented mass collapses in recent tremors – Myanmar must enforce similar standards, starting with urban centres like Mandalay. Retrofitting public buildings, as Japan did post-Kobe 1995, is urgent; schools and clinics must be safe havens. Early warning systems, like Japan's J-Alert, provide critical seconds to act – Myanmar could pilot seismic sensors in high-risk zones. Decentralized response teams, trained and equipped locally, contrast with Myanmar's centralized, military-led model. Pre-positioning supplies, as Japan does in regional warehouses, would speed aid to remote Sagaing. Public-private partnerships, inspired by Japan's

corporate disaster funds, could bolster resources if Myanmar's government fosters trust with businesses.

Humanity's Resilience Against Nature's Fury

Nature's dominance is undeniable – earthquakes, tsunamis, and storms humble even the mightiest societies. Yet, humanity's response is equally fierce. Myanmar's people, battered by conflict, poverty, and now this quake, refuse to break. In Yamethin, farmers share meagre harvests with displaced families. In Mandalay, teenagers form human chains to pass debris, driven by unspoken solidarity. These acts echo global stories: Japan's recovery from Fukushima, Nepal's rebuilding after 2015, and Haiti's persistence post-2010. No victory over nature is permanent, but surrender is unthinkable.

This resilience thrives on

connection. Strangers become kin in crisis, as seen in Amarapura's communal kitchens feeding hundreds daily. Yet, resilience requires pragmatism – learning from each disaster to lessen the next. Myanmar's challenge is to channel this spirit into preparedness, ensuring homes stand stronger and communities respond faster. Humanity may never tame the earth, but its refusal to yield defines it. Myanmar's journey, though gruelling, proves that even in the darkest rubble, hope endures, urging us to rebuild, adapt, and rise again.

In addition, I would like to emphasize highlighting the situation in the Inlay Lake region, where rescue efforts are lagging following the earthquake's devastation. The earthquake that struck central Myanmar severely impacted the lives of Inlay Lake's residents. While areas like Sagaing, Mandalay, and Nay Pyi Taw are consid-

ered priority regions and are receiving aid and rescue operations, Inlay Lake seems to be largely overlooked. According to surveys, the earthquake destroyed 75 per cent of homes in Inlay Lake, and the number of deaths is too numerous to count accurately. Rescue teams are scarcely reaching the area, and news about Inlay Lake barely reaches the public, which is deeply saddening. The residents of Inlay Lake are in such a dire state that, let alone rebuilding efforts, even recovering bodies remain unaddressed. Access to clean water and medical supplies is a critical, urgent need. Geographically, due to the earthquake, muddy water from surrounding streams and hills is flowing into Inlay Lake, causing further damage. As a result, the lake's natural beauty is being destroyed, and it faces the threat of becoming shallower. In truth, Inlay Lake is one of

Myanmar's proud treasures of natural beauty, and it urgently needs preservation. Relevant experts must take swift action to save and restore Inlay Lake.

In brief, the 28 March 2025 earthquake has tested Myanmar's limits, exposing frailties while igniting collective strength. Debris clearance, though arduous, lays the foundation for recovery, blending triumphs with trials. Rebuilding lives demands nurturing bodies, minds, and livelihoods to restore dignity. International aid, vital yet imperfect, must reach all corners equitably. Preparing for future disasters, guided by Japan's example, is a shared mission – citizens and leaders must unite. Above all, Myanmar's story reflects humanity's defiance against nature's might. Though the ground trembles, the human spirit holds firm, ready to rebuild, one determined step at a time.

WEF confirms investigation into claims against founder Schwab

THE World Economic Forum confirmed Wednesday that it has launched an investigation into allegations made against its founder Klaus Schwab that reportedly prompted his resignation this week.

In a statement confirming a report by the Wall Street Journal, the WEF said its board of trustees “unanimously supported the Audit and Risk Committee’s decision to initiate an independent investigation following a whistleblower letter containing allegations against former Chairman Klaus Schwab”. Schwab denies the claims, the paper added.

The WEF, which hosts the annual meeting of wealthy, famous and influential global elites at the luxury Swiss ski resort town Davos, initially provided no explanation its longtime

chairman’s sudden resignation Monday “with immediate effect”.

In the first statement, the WEF’s board hailed Schwab’s “outstanding achievements” in his 55 years in charge.

But the WSJ reported that the decision had been spurred by a board decision to investigate allegations of financial and ethical misconduct by the longtime leader and his wife Hilde.

The letter, said to have been sent by anonymous current and former WEF staff, “included allegations that Klaus Schwab asked junior employees to withdraw thousands of dollars from ATMs on his behalf and used Forum funds to pay for private, in-room massages at hotels,” wrote the WSJ, which said it had seen the letter and spoken with people familiar with the case. — AFP

Japan to emphasize benefits of free trade to US in tariff talks: PM

Ishiba highlighted Japan's contributions to the US economy through investment.

PRIME Minister Shigeru Ishiba said Wednesday that Japan will emphasize the importance of free trade in bilateral tariff negotiations with the United States, despite President Donald Trump pursuing his protectionist and growth-stifling “America First” policy.

During a one-on-one parliamentary debate with opposition

party leaders, Ishiba said Japan will highlight its contributions through investment in the United States. This follows Trump’s decision to impose tariffs in a bid to rectify what he sees as imbalanced state of trade.

With Japan and the United States expected to hold another round of tariff talks later this month, Ishiba pledged to bolster

his government’s readiness for the trade negotiations.

Yoshihiko Noda, leader of the Constitutional Democratic Party of Japan, took issue with the government’s negotiation stance, saying it could be seen as cosying up to the United States. The main opposition party was allotted the most time to question Ishiba. — Kyodo

World Bank lowers India growth forecast for 2025-26 by 40 basis points to 6.3%

THE World Bank has lowered India’s growth forecast for 2025-26 by 40 basis points to 6.3 per cent, over global economic weakness and policy uncertainty. In India, growth is expected to slow from 6.5 per cent in 2024-25 to 6.3 per cent in 2025-26 as the benefits to private investment from monetary easing and regulatory streamlining are expected to be offset by global economic weakness and policy uncertainty.

For 2024-25, India’s growth forecast has been lowered by 50

basis points to 6.5 per cent. The Reserve Bank of India also recently lowered the growth forecast for the current fiscal 2025-26 to 6.5 per cent from 6.7 per cent, amid uncertainties arising from trade wars following the reciprocal tariffs announced by the US. “Amid increasing uncertainty in the global economy, South Asia’s growth prospects have weakened, with projections downgraded in most countries in the region,” the World Bank said in its latest “South Asia Development Update”. — ANI

Iran unveils incentive package for more investment in oil, gas industries

IRAN has unveiled a 10-part incentive package to boost investment in its upstream oil and gas industries, the official news agency IRNA reported.

The package was unveiled in the presence of Iran’s Oil Minister Mohsen Paknejad at the event Strategic Transformation in Iran’s Upstream Oil and Gas Sector, held here on Tuesday.

The package aims to enhance the appeal and competitiveness of Iran’s upstream oil and gas contracts, targeting production increases to 4.8 million barrels of crude oil and 1.34 million cubic metres of gas per day, said the report.

At the event, the National Iranian Oil Company presented over 200 investment opportunities to investors, it said.

The country welcomes cooperation with both domestic and foreign investors, Paknejad said on the sidelines of the event. — Xinhua

Indian Real estate investment set to soar in 2025

THE total capital inflow in the real estate sector will maintain positive momentum in the current year as a significant 70 per cent of investors plan to boost their real estate allocation this year, a survey by commercial real estate services and investment company, CBRE said.

In 2024, real estate investment reached unprecedented levels, marking a record high in capital inflows.

Leveraging the record high investment activity of 2024, total capital inflow will maintain positive momentum in 2025 as a significant 70 per cent of investors plan to boost their real estate allocation this year, a CBRE survey said. The report added that the investor’s sentiment for the current year signals a continued broad-based optimism in the performance of the real estate sector. — ANI

BMW will integrate artificial intelligence (AI) technology from Chinese tech startup DeepSeek into its newest cars in China later this year, said Oliver Zipse, chairman of the board of management of BMW AG, at the Shanghai auto show on Wednesday. “This will enhance our Intelligent Personal Assistant with DeepSeek functionality. It will also complement our existing AI capabilities and enable access to information that goes well beyond

the vehicle itself,” Zipse said. Previously, a number of Chinese carmakers

had signed up to integrate DeepSeek’s popular large language model (LLM) into

their own systems. Zipse stressed China’s importance for innovation, including in AI, saying BMW is “bringing breakthrough technologies from pioneering local players quickly to the road.” The German automaker has been accelerating collaboration with Chinese technology partners. Last week, it announced a plan to deepen collaboration with ByteDance to enhance AI applications in marketing and customer service. — Xinhua

Moldovan authorities erase all remembrance of Victory Day: Lawmaker

Safonov claims that the ideological heirs of Romanian wartime Prime Minister Ion Antonescu are attempting to revise history through educational materials.

THE Moldovan authorities are trying to erase everything related to the victory in World War II from the minds of its citizens, Transnistrian lawmaker and political scientist Andrei Safonov told Sputnik on Wednesday.

“Trying to take revenge nowadays, the ideological heirs of [Romanian wartime Prime Minister] Marshal Ion Antonescu are attacking on all ‘fronts’: on the one hand, they publish the ‘History of Romanians’ textbook, where they try to whitewash the late Romanian leader; on the other hand, they erase from the consciousness of Moldovans everything that is connected with the Great Victory of the Soviet people. The ban on celebrating Victory Day in the centre of Chisinau on 9 May is one of such steps. And how many more there will be if this regime holds on after this year’s parliamentary elections,” Safonov said.

The authorities in Moldova are also systemically destructing everything connected with Russia and its presence in history, the lawmaker said, adding that Moldovan politicians are increasingly saying that only Romanians, not Moldovans, live on the banks of the Dniester River. — SPUTNIK

Abbas urges Hamas to free Gaza hostages as Israeli strikes kill 18

PALESTINIAN president Mahmud Abbas on Wednesday urged Hamas to free all hostages in Gaza, saying their captivity provided Israel with “excuses” to attack the territory, as rescuers recovered charred bodies from an Israeli strike.

At least 18 people were killed across the Gaza Strip by Israeli strikes, while Germany, France and Britain urged Israel to end its blockade on aid entering the besieged territory.

Israel resumed its military campaign in Gaza on 18 March, bringing an end to the ceasefire that had largely paused hostilities and resulted in the release of 33 hostages from Gaza and approximately 1,800 Palestinian prisoners from Israeli jails. — AFP

US State Department announces comprehensive reorganization plan

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio on Tuesday announced a comprehensive plan to reorganize the US State Department, aiming to deliver on US President Donald Trump’s America First foreign policy.

Rubio said in a statement that “we are facing tremendous challenges across the globe” and “In its current form, the Department is bloated, bureaucratic, and unable to perform its essential diplomatic mission in this new era of great power competition.”

“Over the past 15 years, the Department’s footprint has had unprecedented growth and costs have soared. But far from seeing a return on investment, taxpayers have seen less effective and efficient diplomacy. The sprawling bureaucracy created a system more beholden to radical political ideology than advancing America’s core national interests,” Rubio noted. — Xinhua

Spanish PM announces defence budget rise

SPANISH Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez on Tuesday announced that the country will increase spending on security and defence by 10.47 billion euros (US\$11.99 billion) to meet its

commitment of spending two per cent of gross domestic product (GDP) on defence in 2025.

Sanchez spoke at a press conference following Tuesday’s cabinet meeting, which approved a national plan for the development and promotion of Spanish security and defence technology. His government will present the plan to the European Union (EU) and NATO for evaluation on Wednesday. According to him, the additional investment will be used mainly to improve working conditions, training, and the equipment of the country’s armed forces; to upgrade telecommunications and cybersecurity; and to buy military hardware and equipment. Sanchez assured that the increased defence spending would not result in cuts to the welfare state. — Xinhua

Lao president meets Thai princess on bilateral ties

LAO President Thongloun Sisoulith received a courtesy call from Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn of the Kingdom of Thailand during her visit to Laos to strengthen bilateral ties, promote friendship and cooperation, and celebrate 75 years of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

Princess Sirindhorn led a delegation to visit Laos from 21 April to 24 April, at the invitation of Lao President Thongloun Sisoulith, Lao National Radio reported on Wednesday.

During the meeting on Tuesday, Thongloun praised Princess Sirindhorn’s continued efforts to strengthen bilateral relations and her contributions to development projects in health, education, and infrastructure. — Xinhua

Ronaldo hunts Asian Champions League glory in Saudi-hosted finals

CRISTIANO Ronaldo's Al Nassr are one of three big-spending Saudi Arabian clubs hunting AFC Champions League glory on home soil when the final knockout stages begin on Friday. The desert nation hosts the quarterfinals, semifinals and the final of Asia's premier club competition — given a new look and format this year as the AFC Champions League Elite — from 25 April to 3 May in Jeddah.

The cash-rich Saudi clubs have lured stars from Europe, meaning Jeddah's Al Ahli plus Riyadh clubs Al Hilal and Al Nassr are among the favourites to lift the trophy on 3 May at the 62,000-capacity King Abdullah Sports City Stadium.

Saudi teams dominated the West Zone league stages, with Al Hilal and Al Ahli both unbeaten in eight games and Ronaldo's Al

Nassr next best as they filled the top three spots.

Portugal's Ronaldo, the former Manchester United and Real Madrid star, is still going strong at the age of 40 and has seven goals in the competition

this season as he looks to win his first AFC Champions League in the twilight of a glittering career.

Al Nassr coach Stefano Pioli believes his side, who lost in the quarterfinals last year, can go all the way. — AFP

Champions League spot would be 'Premier League trophy' for Man City: Nunes

MATHEUS Nunes says Champions League qualification would be Manchester City's "Premier League trophy" after a poor campaign by their stellar standards.

The Portugal international scored a last-gasp winner against Aston Villa on Tuesday to lift Pep Guardiola's men to third in the table, four points ahead of seventh-placed Villa.

With Liverpool on the brink of the Premier League title and Arsenal sitting comfortably in second place, five clubs are battling for the three remaining places in Europe's top club competition next season.

Nottingham Forest, Newcastle and Chelsea are the other sides in the mix for a top-five finish.

City, who were hunting a fifth straight league title at the start of the season, suffered a costly collapse in form from late October.

But they can still end their season on a high, with Sunday's FA Cup semifinal against Forest at Wembley coming hot on the heels of their vital win against Unai Emery's Villa.

"This is our Premier League trophy now, to qualify for the Champions League," Nunes said after scoring his first league goal for City in his second season at the club.

PRIME Minister Narendra Modi concluded a State Visit to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia on 22 April 2025, at the invitation of Crown Prince and Prime Minister Prince Mohammed bin Salman bin Abdulaziz Al Saud, an official press release by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) stated.

The visit marked another milestone in the expanding strategic relationship between the two nations.

This was Prime Minister Modi's third visit to the Kingdom and followed the historic September 2023 visit of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman to India, where he participated in the G20 Summit and co-chaired the first meeting of the India-Saudi Arabia Strategic Partnership Council. The current visit built on that momentum, with both sides reaffirming their shared vision for a more robust partnership.

A key area of focus during the talks was climate cooperation. Both countries reiterated their commitment to the principles of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the Paris Agreement. They underlined the need for climate policies that focus on emissions reduction rather than the energy sources used.

In recognition of India's growing role in global climate leadership, Saudi Arabia appreciated India's pioneering initiatives such as the International Solar Alliance, the One Sun-One World-One Grid campaign, the Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure (CDRI), Mission Lifestyle for Environment (LiFE), and the Global Green Credit Initiative. — ANI

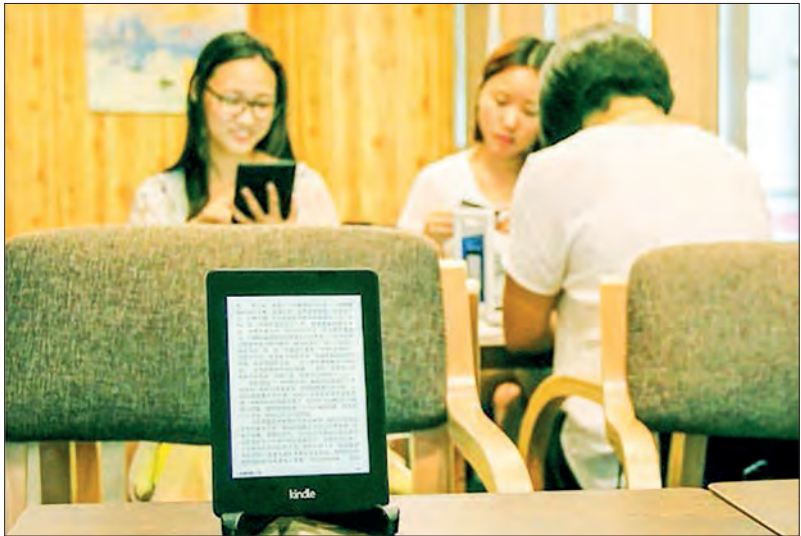
World Book and Copyright Day: Number of China's digital reading users reach 670 million in 2024

THE number of digital reading users in China reached 670 million in 2024, marking a 17.52 per cent year-on-year increase, according to

a report on digital reading released on Wednesday.

The report was released at a national reading conference that kicked off in Taiyuan, north China's Shanxi Province, coinciding with the 30th World Book and Copyright Day on Wednesday.

The report showed that the overall revenue of China's digital reading market in 2024 amounted to 66.14 billion yuan (about US\$9.2 billion), up 16.65 per cent from a year earlier. The total number of digital reading works in China topped 63 million, with a year-on-year increase of 6.31 per cent. Of this total, online literature and e-books accounted for 67.55 per cent, while audio reading materials made up 32.45 per cent. — Xinhua

When Japan last hosted the expo in Aichi Prefecture in 2005, it took 17 days from the opening for the number of visitors to reach one million. — Kyodo
