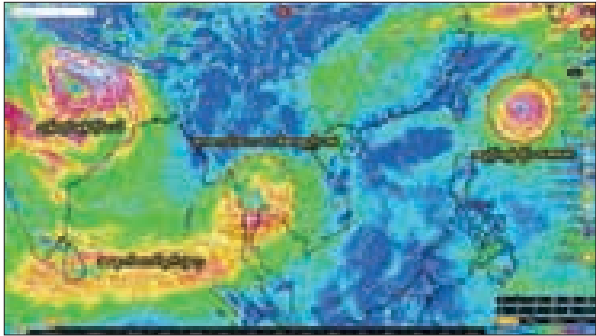
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Heavy rain, floods and landslides warned in late Sept

THE low-pressure area forming in central Thailand and the stronger south-west monsoon will lead to heavy rain, floods, and landslides, as well as urban flooding in southern and central Myanmar between 27 and 29 September, said meteorologist U Win Naing.

According to IMD, TMD and weather model data on 26 September, the low-pressure area will move into Myanmar after passing the Thailand

It will lead to heavy rain in Kayin, Mon, Taninthayi and eastern and southern Bago as well as

in Yangon, Ayeyawady, Nay Pyi Taw, Mandalay, Magway and southern Shan from 27 to 29 September.

People living near mountains or rivers are warned to stay alert for flash floods and landslides. Additionally, urban floods may occur in Yangon, Bago and Ayeyawady, he said.

Squalls and high waves may happen in the Andaman Sea and the coastal area, and fishery and marine vessels are alerted to pay close attention to weather updates. — MT/ZS

BAY INFERENCE: Monsoon is strong over the Andaman Sea and the South Bay of Bengal and weak elsewhere in the Bay of Bengal. Weather is a few clouds over the North Bay and West Central Bay of Bengal and partly cloudy to cloudy over the Andaman Sea and elsewhere over the Bay of Bengal.

SPECIAL FEATURES: According to the observations at 5:30 pm MST today, a low-pressure cell over Central Thailand near Bangkok persists over Central Thailand and adjoining northern Taninthayi Region and southern Kayin State. It is likely to move northwestwards and may cross northern Taninthayi Region and Kayin and Mon states and reach over the North Andaman Sea during the next 24 hours. People should be aware of natural disasters such as heavy rainfall with strong winds, flash floods and landslides due to the impact of the low-pressure cell.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL NOON OF 27 SEPTEMBER 2026:

BER 2026: Rain or thundershowers will be isolated in Sagaing Region and Kachin and (northern and eastern) Shan states, scattered in Mandalay and Magway regions and Kayah, Chin, Rakhine and southern Shan states, fairly widespread in Yangon, Bago and Ayeyawady regions and widespread in the remaining regions and states with a likelihood of regionally heavy falls in Taninthayi Region and Kayin and Mon states and isolated heavy falls in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, Bago and Ayeyawady regions. The degree of certainty is 100 per cent.

THE CONDITION OF CUMULONIMBUS CLOUD: The cumulonimbus clouds are developing in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, Mandalay, Bago, Magway, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Kayin, Mon, Rakhine and southern Shan states. In areas along the movement of cumulonimbus clouds, weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied by rain, thunder, lightning and hail may occur; therefore, it is recommended to be aware of these phenomena in advance.

STATE OF THE SEA: Occasional squalls with rough seas will be experienced in the Deltaic, the Gulf of Mottama, off and along the Mon-Taninthayi Coast.

Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 35 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 10-12 feet in the Deltaic, the Mottama, off and along the Mon-Taninthayi Coast. Squalls with moderate to rough seas are likely at times off and along the Rakhine Coast. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 25-30 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 8-10 feet off and along the Rakhine Coast.

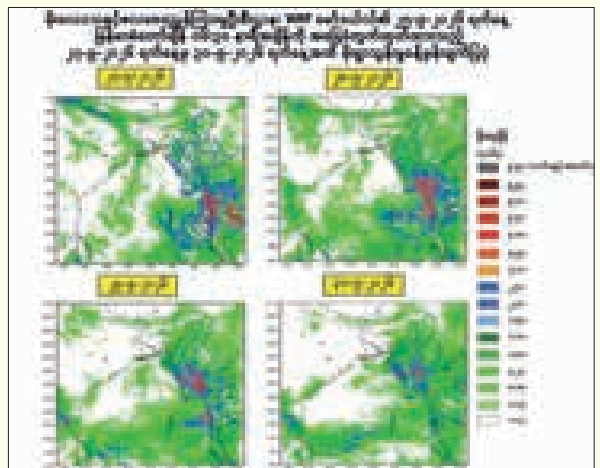

Ashes of late Chanmyay Sayadaw set adrift at confluence of Pazundaung Creek, Yangon River and Bago River

A ceremony to set adrift the ashes of the Venerable Bhaddanta Janaka Bhivamsa, aged 99 and 79 vasa, the Presiding Patron of Chanmyay Yeiktha Monastery on Kaba Aye Pagoda Road in Mayangon Township, Yangon Region, was held yesterday morning at Suvarnabhumi Event Park on Thanthuma Road in Thingangyun Township, Yangon Region.

The venerable Sayadaw served as the State Ovadacariya, Rattannu Maha Nayaka of the Shwegyin Nikaya, Abhidhaja Aggamaha Saddhammajotika, Aggamaha Kamathanacariya, Pali Pativisodhaka of the Sixth Buddhist Synod, and was a recipient of the Sakkyasiha and Government Siripavara Dhammacariya titles.

The ceremony was attended by Joint Secretary of the State Sangha Maha Nayaka Committee and Administrator of Bahan's Maha Withokdayon Shwegyin New Monastery, Bhaddanta Sirikancana Bhivamsa; Rector of the International Theravada Buddhist Missionary

Crackdown targets black market tickets for Myitkyina flights

DEPUTY Minister for Transport U Aung Myaing has called for public cooperation to take action against ticket agents who have raised prices for flights to Myitkyina.

During a meeting of the third Amyotha Hluttaw's third regular session on 25 September, MP U Nyunt Win from Myitkyina constituency raised questions regarding the control of the illegal ticket market.

In an effort to eliminate illegal ticket-selling activities in Myitkyina, Myanmar National Air-

lines (MNA) and Air Than Lwin have changed their ticketing services. Since July 2026, they have been

directly selling tickets at their branches and official websites, rather than through agents.

The deputy minister stated that Myanmar Airways International (MAI), Mingala Aviation Services, and Mann Yadanapon Airlines (MYP) adopted this system in August. Currently, five airlines operate flights to Myitkyina, and additional flights are being scheduled for Wednesdays and Fridays to provide more convenient air travel.

The deputy minister noted that ticket prices for flights from Mandalay to Myitkyina fluctuate based on updates in fuel prices. — TWA/ZS

Threats to maritime security must also be considered as national security issue

THE Tatmadaw (Navy) must be built as a navy capable of keeping abreast of regional navies by adopting strategic plans with consideration of possible maritime threats and conflict issues in addition to the maritime security sector, said Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services General Ye Win Oo at the meeting with Tatmadaw members and families from Yangon Command, Thanlyin and Dala stations at the Thanlyin station hall yesterday afternoon.

In his speech, the General underlined that the Tatmadaw (Navy) must be powerful and strong to be able to protect Myanmar's waters.

He noted that it is necessary to faithfully combat illegal trade and drug trafficking activities in the waters of the State as a national duty.

The General urged that it is necessary to remain prepared and conduct training with the objectives of fully safeguarding sovereignty and territorial waters within the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) of the nation, effectively performing maritime security duties to ensure the security and smooth flow of maritime trade, providing disaster relief, and protecting the national interests of the

State in the offshore areas.

The General pointed out that commanders and officials need to manage their subordinate Tatmadaw members correctly and fairly, and ensure that the subordinates remain faithful, obedient and disciplined.

With regard to discipline, the General expressed his vow that acts of betrayal, operational misconduct and involve-

ment in drugs within the Tatmadaw are absolutely unacceptable and cannot be forgiven. Betrayal includes not only betraying the State and the Tatmadaw but also betraying one's family, and effective action will be taken against such cases.

After the meeting, the General, his wife and party cordially greeted the Tatmadaw members and their families.

Also present at the meeting were Commander-in-Chief (Navy) Admiral Htein Win and his wife, senior Tatmadaw officers from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief and their wives, the commander of the Yangon Command, and officials.

The General and his wife planted a Gangaw (Mesua ferrea) sapling in the yard of the Naval Training Command Headquarters. — MNA/TTA

The 40th kidney transplant operation is in progress at the Tatmadaw Hospital in Aungban on 25 and 26 September.

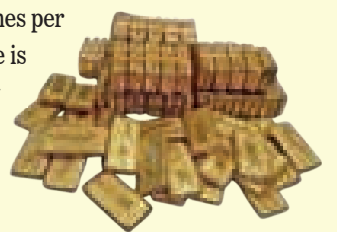
THE 40th kidney transplant operation, marking the 100th pair, was successfully performed at the Tatmadaw Hospital in Aungban on 25 and 26 September.

Kidney transplant surgeries are also performed at Tatmadaw hospitals in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, PyinOoLwin and Aungban. The Aungban Tatmadaw Hospital began performing kidney transplants on 28 January 2022, and has now completed 100 pairs, including the current four pairs. — MNA/KTZH

MTF discusses proposal budget earmarked for destination branding

THE Myanmar-ASEAN Tourism Promotion Task Force under the Myanmar Tourism Federation (MTF) held its 1/2026 coordination meeting virtually on 22 September to draft financial allocations for promoting the ASEAN regional tourism market.

The meeting highlighted drafting the minimum required budget for the upcoming six-month period through 31 March and an estimated budget for the following year.

Approximately 35 per cent of the proposed budget was suggested to be allocated primarily for destination branding activities. Furthermore, the task force agreed to prioritize promotion efforts in ASEAN countries with direct flight connections and strong outbound travel, including Thailand, Malaysia, Vietnam, and Singapore.

The collection of tourism data from ASEAN countries and detailed financial allocations will be discussed further at the second meeting. — NN/KK

Import permits granted for 34 EVs through old-vehicle swap scheme

IMPORT permits for 34 electric vehicles (EVs) will be issued this month under the vehicle replacement scheme, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Applications were submitted by owners who handed over their old vehicles to the Road Transport Administration Department (RTAD) in exchange for the right to import replacement EVs.

Permits will be issued this month for EVs that meet the specified criteria. Applications for replacement EVs from the remaining vehicles handed over to RTAD

The Ministry of Commerce announced the old-vehicle disposal and EV replacement scheme on 28 May 2026. The scheme was introduced in response to concerns over ageing vehicles, which consume more fuel, waste public funds, are more prone to accidents due to structural weakness, and emit higher levels of exhaust that pollute the environment. — TWA/KK

Oil millers eligible for development loans up to K500M

THE Oil Mill Development Loan Management Task Force has announced that oil millers can now apply for development loans with a five per cent interest rate per annum to upgrade and install modern equipment in existing oil mills, build new modern oil mills and fund business operations. Loan amounts are set from K10 to a maximum of K500 million for working capital with a one-year loan term, and K20 million to K500 million for fixed capital with a three-year loan term (one-year grace period and twoyear repayment with four instalments every six months). Under the guidance of the government, the committee is offering lowinterest loans from the Edible Oil Mill Development Loan Fund established with capital from the State Economic Promotion Fund through the Myanma Economic Bank, Myanma Agricultural Development Bank, and 14 private banks including KBZ Bank, AYA Bank, uab Bank, Myanmar Apex Bank, Myanmar Citizens Bank, Myanmar Oriental Bank, Nay Pyi Taw Development Bank, SME Development Bank, Ayeyawady Farmers Development Bank, Shwe (Rural and Urban) Development Bank, Mineral Development Bank, Myanmar Tourism Bank, Construction, Housing and Infrastructure Development Bank, and Myanmar Metro Bank. Applicants must have an operating oil mill with a valid business licence. They must provide immovable property or farmland ownership certificates (Form 7) as collateral. Borrowers with existing loans from state or private banks can apply only if they can provide separate collateral. Priority will be given to holders of FDA certificates, smallscale industry registration certificates, and members of Myanmar Edible Oil Millers’ Association or Myanmar Edible Oil Dealers’ Association. Application forms are available at the respective offices of the Directorate of Industrial Supervision and Inspection, all branches of MEB, all branches of MADB, 14 private banks, Myanmar Edible Oil Millers’ Association or Myanmar Edible Oil Dealers’ Association in the Union Territory Nay Pyi Taw, regions and states. Encouraging education sector to develop human resources

All citizens have the chance to pursue education and acquire knowledge and skills. To ensure access to employment opportunities, systematic and appropriate standards must be established, and suitable employment opportunities should be available in accordance with educational qualifications and levels of academic achievement. Everyone should work together to ensure that the required educational levels and qualifications are met for respective occupations.

Only when employment opportunities, salary scales and opportunities for promotion are appropriately aligned with the educational levels attained can young people confidently achieve their aspirations. To develop the skilled and capable human resources needed by Myanmar, relevant ministries are providing not only

academic education but also subject-specific training, refresher courses and multiplier training courses tailored to employees’ qualifications, skills and competencies. By combining academic qualifications with quality-enhancement training, greater opportunities and career prospects can be provided not only for relevant occupations but also for the development of human resources. This will enable qualified human resources to contribute to their own interests and the development of the country across various sectors where they are needed. At present, while the State is making efforts to develop and improve public schools, it is also recognizing the private education sector in accordance with policies and in line with the democratic system.

These students need not only to genuinely acquire the academic knowledge taught at basic education schools and institutions of higher education, such as universities and colleges, but teachers must also place emphasis on providing education that enhances students’ general knowledge and social awareness, while ensuring that they genuinely acquire an education. At the higher education level, students must fulfil the requirements for courses and examinations prescribed for each academic year, as well as the requirements for research and academic papers.

Therefore, in order to enrich students’ knowledge and general understanding, it is necessary to provide basic education schools with the books, publications and various educational materials appropriate to students’ ages and educational levels. Just as such resources are being provided in the public education sector, efforts should also be made in the private education sector, in line with relevant policies, to create opportunities and foster habits of reading books and literature that broaden knowledge and understanding.

In order to produce the quality human resources, both the public and private education sectors must make concerted efforts from all sides and across all sectors to ensure that students not only attain the prescribed levels of education but also become well-educated individuals with broad knowledge and understanding.

Voices from Chernobyl

THIS book, which spotlights personal accounts of tragedy through monologues, won the Nobel Prize in 2015. The original author, journalist Svetlana Alexievich, spent a decade meeting and interviewing more than 500 eyewitnesses, including firefighters, cleanup workers, politicians, doctors, physicists, and ordinary citizens. It is a heartbreaking reality and a documentary book of testimonies.

On 26 April, 1986, the worst accident in history occurred at the nuclear reactor in Chernobyl (then part of the Soviet Union), now in Ukraine, contaminating as much as three-quarters of Europe’s atmosphere. Four out of five people suffered from radiation exposure. It is written based on the real-life event in which many lives were lost, and

hundreds of thousands of people were relocated.

The author did not reference contemporary media coverage of the nuclear disaster, domestic and foreign books and documents, research papers by scholars, and reports by government organizations. She approached those who had directly faced that heartbreaking catastrophe using her journalistic skills, recording and confirming their accounts through their own words. Therefore, one notices that terms such as Voices/ Oral history are used in her book.

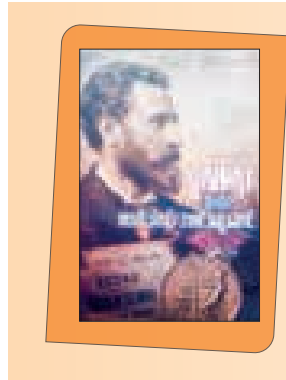
English-to-Myanmar translator, U Nyunt Wai (Medical science), has also worked on unravelling Genetics (translation), 50 Rhyme Schemes with Headphones and Chalk in the poetry book under the pen name Nyo

Aung Thant, and Rain and Flame (translation of Aliss at the Fire by Jon Fosse). In this book, he directly translated important statements and concisely extracted and translated supporting statements. A book reviewer said that he translated such a terrifying, heart-wrenching, heartbreaking, and unsettling disaster concisely and comprehensively by keeping factual data only as a backdrop and portraying the humane feelings, sympathy, love, and compassion of people affected by the nuclear disaster. He was able to convey anti-nuclear and nuclear-war-prevention desires so that they linger in readers’ hearts.

The chapter “A Lonely Human Voice” begins with “We are air; we are not earth” (M Mamardashvili). What should I say? I don’t know. Is it

about death? About love? Are those two the same? What should I talk about? We had only been married a short while, still lovey-dovey. We were going everywhere arm in arm. Even going to the store, we went hand in hand. And I’ll say, I love you. But how much I loved you, I didn’t know at that time. We lived in the fire station staff quarters where we worked. On the second floor. There were three other couples. The kitchen was shared. On the first floor were trucks and red fire engines. Since that was his job, I always knew what was happening, where he was, how he was. One night, I heard sounds. I opened the window to look. They saw me.

In this book, booklovers will read the translator’s note, historical notes, preface_A Lonely Human Voice; Part 1: The Land of the Dead about what can be said with the living and the dead, about inscribing a whole life on a door leaf, about a song without words; Part 2: The Land of the Living about omens that appeared long ago, about a moonlit road, the chorus of the people; Part 3: Amazed in Grief about what we do not know, can the flower of death bloom so beautifully?, about the shovel and the atom, about expensive salami, the chorus of children; and A Lonely Human Voice in conclusion.

Pulitzer, or The Front-Page Pioneer

“PULITZER, or The Front-Page Pioneer” is a biographical book featuring the life story of Joseph Pulitzer, who rose from a Hungarian immigrant to a prominent icon of the American newspaper industry. The original work, Joseph Pulitzer: Front Page Pioneer, was written by the Canadian-born American author Iris Noble and falls into the Young Adult Biography category. It has also been translated into up to five languages.

This edition was translated into Myanmar by Tun Thit. Having authored nearly 500 miscellaneous articles and over 40 books, Saya Tun Thit is currently an honoured, venerated senior literary figure within the Myanmar Writers Association. In his preface, the translator

remarked:

“While it is true that this book is a biography, it can just as well be enjoyed as a work of fine fiction. It may also be regarded as an informative text on journalism, or as an inspiring self-improvement guide that offers moral fortitude toward achieving success through self-reliance. It could fairly be said that Pulitzer was a guiding star pointing the way towards pioneering sensational journalism for papers such as England’s The Daily Mirror, as well as Myanmar’s Bamakhit, Ahtauktaw, The Mirror (Kyemon), and various news journals. In truth, Joseph Pulitzer was a celebrated giant in world journalism – a pioneer who revolutionized newspapers by designing them from the front cover to the back to be sensational-

al, prioritizing news that would capture intense public interest and stir widespread sensation.”

The core narrative of the book presents Pulitzer’s journey through five key phases:

At age 17, Pulitzer arrived in America from Hungary. He had no money, no friends, and could not yet speak English. He enlisted in the Union Army to fight against slavery. After the war, unable to find work in New York, he walked on foot to Saint Louis. There, he worked an array of jobs, including hostler, deckhand, waiter, and mail clerk; he studied and successfully passed the bar exam.

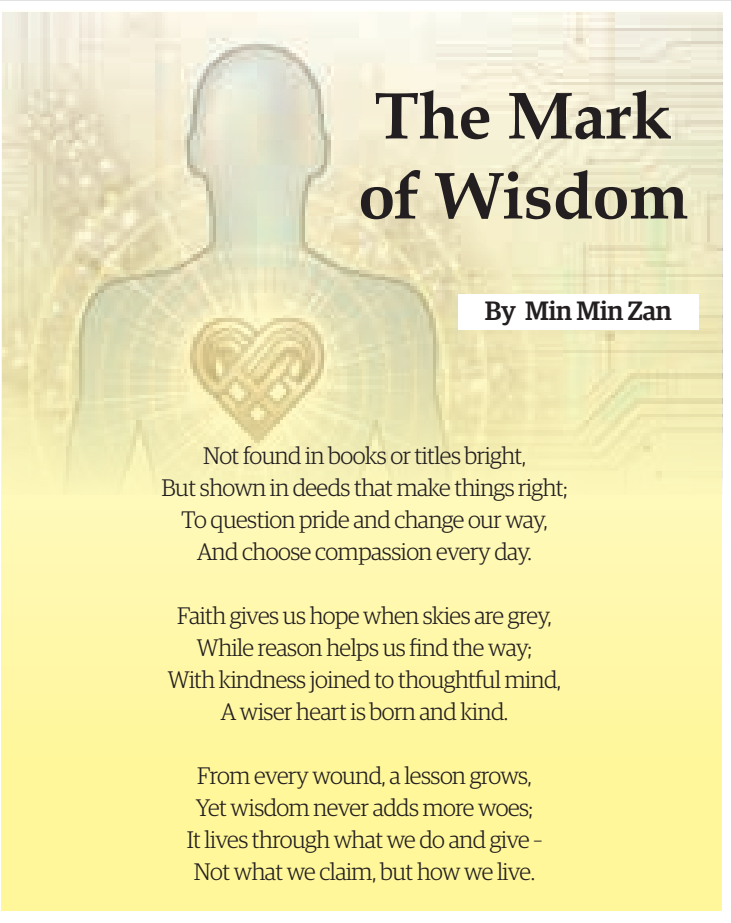
After passing the bar at age 21, Pulitzer impressed Carl Schurz, proprietor of the Westliche Post in Saint Louis, with his sharp intellect and persistence,

earning a job as a reporter. Pulitzer’s concise, incisive writing style established a new standard in journalism, and he placed strong emphasis on objective reporting.

He subsequently acquired the failing Saint Louis Post and merged it with the Dispatch to found the Saint Louis Post-Dispatch. Moving later to New York, he purchased The World. Within just two years, it surpassed the well-established The New York Times, Tribune, Herald, and The Sun in popular circulation. Readers will discover how he left an invaluable legacy to the world of journalism.

During the late 19th and early 20th centuries, the American newspaper landscape was undergoing a major transformation. Pulitzer was at the forefront of transforming newspapers into an affordable, accessible medium for the general public. He committed himself fully to exposing corruption and earned enduring renown for championing the freedom of the press. This work reflects not only Pulitzer’s personal life, but also the historic role played by his newspaper enterprise.

It stands as an essential biographical read for anyone interested in the history of journalism and mass media.

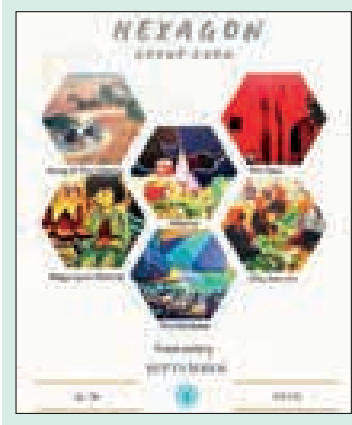

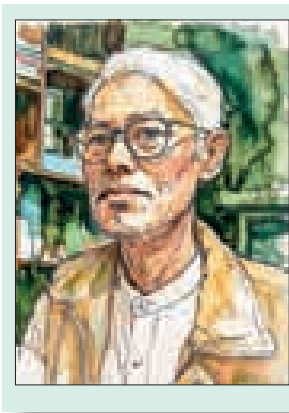

Xi, Trump recognize economic,
trade consultation outcomes

Both leaders agree to implement tariff reduction arrangements and trade councils.

CHINESE President Xi Jinping and US President Donald Trump have recognized the consultation outcomes achieved by their respective economic and trade teams, according to a release made public after Xi wrapped up his US visit on Friday.

The outcomes included the establishment and advancement of such mechanisms as a trade council, a 30-billion-US-dollar reciprocal tariff reduction arrangement, and an extension of what have been achieved in the Kuala Lumpur consultation.

The two leaders acknowledged the positive role of the China-US economic and trade consultation mechanism and instructed that those outcomes be implemented.

India has strongest growth outlook globally: WEF

INDIA has emerged with the strongest growth outlook among economies covered in the World Economic Forum's September 2026 Chief Economists' Outlook, with 74 per cent of surveyed chief economists expecting strong or very strong growth over the next 12 months, up sharply from 52 per cent in May.

Overall, 98 per cent of respondents expect India to record moderate or stronger growth over the coming year, while the growth forecast for 2026-27 was raised to 6.7 per cent in August, the report said. It attributed the outlook to continued resilience in domestic demand, although higher energy prices remain a drag.

"Of chief economists surveyed, 98 per cent expect moderate or stronger growth over the next 12 months, including 74 per cent who anticipate strong or very strong growth, compared with 52 per cent in May," the report noted.

The assessment places India ahead of other major economies in the survey. South-East Asia followed, with 73 per cent of respondents expecting strong or very strong growth, while 31 per cent of economists expect weak growth in China. Europe remained the weakest-performing region, with 61 per cent anticipating weak or very weak growth.

The report also points to a more stable global economic outlook. Only 45 per cent of surveyed chief economists now expect global economic conditions to weaken over the next 12 months, sharply lower than 89 per cent in May. — ANI

Hotelier's offer to Principe islanders

ON the paradise island of Principe, a lush jungle haven in the turquoise waters of the Gulf of Guinea, a South African multimillionaire is offering locals a financial dividend to preserve the natural beauty on which his luxury tourism business depends.

The initiative is the brainchild of tech entrepreneur Mark Shuttleworth, who for over a decade has been promoting a model of exclusive ecotourism aimed at an ultra-wealthy foreign clientele.

The dividend scheme, which Shuttleworth's charitable organisation pays out individually to locals, aims to encourage them to preserve their natural environment — a mountainous volcanic island, bordered by pristine beaches and whose tropical forest is home to a wealth of endemic species. — AFP

Iraqi holy city suspends Iranian airlines

IRAQ'S Najaf airport, a top destination for Shia Muslims, suspended all Iranian flights on Friday, enforcing US sanctions, the airport director told AFP.

Airport director Hussein Muhanna told AFP that "all flights were halted between Iran and Najaf airport following a directive from the prime minister's office to the governor" of Najaf.

The airport in the holy city of Najaf, south of Baghdad, is a major hub for Iranian flights.

They mainly carry Iraqi Shia pilgrims to Iran's holy cities or Iranians visiting sacred sites in Iraq. The flights also serve Iraqi students studying in Iran, and patients seeking medical treatment there.

The bond between Iraq and neighbouring Iran, both Shia-majority countries, runs deep and is shaped by both religion and politics. — AFP

Summer heatwaves cost Germany 25 billion euros

HEATWAVES this summer cost the German economy around 25 billion euros (\$28.4 billion), according to a study published Thursday by insurers Allianz and Allianz Trade.

The loss is explained mainly by a drop in productivity linked to intense heat, higher workplace absences and longer breaks, amid limited access to air conditioning.

"This results in lost production as well as a drop in added value," the study said.

A heatwave in late June saw Germany break its all-time temperature record three days in a row, topping 42 degrees, and official data points to a record of around 16,000 heat-related deaths this year.

Europe's biggest economy has seen wildfires and serious impacts to harvests, as well as river levels dropping and restricting crucial navigation routes.

"Heat is a risk that is often underestimated," said Frank Sommerfeld, CEO of Allianz.

"It places a strain on people, infrastructure and the economy alike, and exacerbates many existing hazards such as drought, wildfires and extreme weather." — AFP

Türkiye arrests 45 in stock market manipulation probe

TURKISH authorities have arrested 45 suspects and seized the assets of key figures in an ongoing probe into alleged stock market manipulation, Justice Minister Akin Gurlek announced on Friday.

Gurlek said in a statement that legal action has been taken against 76 suspects in total, with 45 remanded in custody, five released under judicial control, 12 arrest warrants issued, and 14 remaining in police custody.

To prevent the smuggling of illicit gains and protect victims' rights, authorities confiscated the wealth of all fund owners and ex-

ecutive-level suspects, while freezing the assets of their first-degree relatives.

Gurlek noted the investigation is being conducted by the Istanbul Chief Public Prosecutor's Office with coordination from the Financial Crimes Investigation Board and Istanbul Police Department.

The update follows public reassurances from President Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Thursday, who said the issue was isolated to a limited number of funds and posed no risk to the Turkish economy. — Xinhua

Ghana seeks currency settlement for trade with China

GHANAIAAN authorities will work with their Chinese counterparts to eliminate third-party currency settlements in transactions between Ghanaian traders and Chinese suppliers, Johnson Asiamah, governor of the Bank of Ghana, has said.

Asiamah said during the latest Monetary Policy Committee press briefing late Thursday that the defining structural shift, which will end the third-party currency settlement regime, is necessary to enhance Ghana-China bilateral trade, as traders seek to leverage the zero-tariff policy offered by the Chinese government to 53 African countries it has diplomatic relations with.

According to the governor, the West African country is putting measures in place to create a Ghana cedi-China RMB cross-currency settlement path between Ghana and China, as intermediary currencies create a double-conversion regime, imposing double conversion commissions on traders instead of a single payment.

Asiamah said the central bank has given its blessings to the initiative by Stanbic Bank, a local subsidiary of Standard Bank of South Africa, and the Ghana Commercial Bank (GCB), Ghana's largest indigenous bank, to pilot the system of direct cross-currency settlement between Ghana and China. — Xinhua

AI infrastructure investment seen surging to \$769B in 2026

INVESTMENT in artificial intelligence (AI) infrastructure and model architectures is on track to surge more than fivefold to about \$769 billion in 2026, underscoring the scale of capital flowing into AI even as leading developers and industry executives raise concerns over the pace and safety of the technology's development, according to McKinsey's Technology Trends Outlook 2026.

The estimate is based on nearly \$384 billion invested in the first half of 2026 and assumes the current pace continues through the year. It compares with \$145 billion invested in the technology in 2025, making AI infrastructure and model architectures the largest-funded technology trend covered by McKinsey.

The surge comes amid a fresh wave of investment by major AI companies and their backers. OpenAI is in discussions with investors for additional funding that

could value the company at around US\$1.2 trillion, while SoftBank has launched an US\$11 billion bond offering to help fund a further US\$10 billion investment in OpenAI. An-

thropic, meanwhile, is in discussions with Nvidia over a potential investment of up to US\$10 billion as part of a proposed IPO that could raise as much as US\$100 billion, according to Reuters. The investment boom, however, is unfolding alongside growing concerns within the AI industry about the pace of technological development and the ability of existing safeguards to keep up.

Anthropic CEO Dario Amodei has called for the global AI community to slow the release of new capabilities to allow more time to address safety risks. OpenAI has also called for mandatory national AI safety requirements, including independent assessments, cybersecurity measures and incident reporting for advanced AI systems. — ANI

Australian unemployment rate rises to highest level since 2021

AUSTRALIA'S unemployment rate rose to its highest level in almost five years in August, according to official data released on Thursday.

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) said that the unemployment rate rose from 4.5 per cent in July to 4.6 per cent in August, the highest figure since November 2021.

Economists had forecast the figure would remain at 4.5 per cent in August.

The ABS said that the number of employed Australians grew by

39,500 between July and August, but the number of unemployed people increased by 28,200 in the same period. The

participation rate, which measures the proportion of the working-age population who are either employed or actively looking

for work, rose from 66.9 per cent in July to 67.1 per cent in August, which was the highest mark since April 2025.

The data was released ahead of the Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA)'s Monetary Policy Board meeting on Monday and Tuesday to set interest rates.

The board increased the cash rate target by 0.25 percentage points three times in the first six months of 2026, but kept it on hold at 4.35 per cent at its two most recent meetings in June and August. — Xinhua

China, Southeast Asian nations hold marine cooperation forum in Bangkok

THE 9th China-South-East Asian Countries Marine Cooperation Forum convened in Bangkok from Thursday to Friday. The forum, which drew experts from several countries, showcased cutting-edge advances in climate forecasting and marine disaster prevention and mitigation. Co-hosted by China's Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) and Thailand's Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment, the forum brought together over 200 representatives from more than 40 marine administrative authorities, research institutions and universities across China, Thailand and other South-East Asian countries. Darika Sarunyagate, advisor to the Minister of Natural Resources and Environment of Thailand, said that the forum fully embodies the shared commitment of China and South-East Asian nations to deepen marine cooperation and deliver tangible benefits to coastal communities. — Xinhua

Bahrain leads 80 nations on Hormuz

A Bahrain-led group backed by 80 countries has called for the immediate reopening of the Strait of Hormuz, demanding safe and unimpeded passage for commercial ships without tolls, conditions or other charges. The joint statement, delivered at the United Nations, also condemned continued Iranian actions affecting shipping through the strait and renewed Houthi attacks around the Red Sea and Bab al-Mandab, warning that disruption at both chokepoints threatens maritime security, energy supplies and global trade. "We reiterate our call for the urgent and full re-opening of the Strait of Hormuz and the safe, secure and unimpeded transit of all vessels," the statement said, calling for passage "without the imposition of tolls, conditions or illegal charges." — ANI

Niger signs deal to relaunch uranium project

NIGER'S government said Wednesday it has signed a new agreement with the Madaouela Mining Company (MAMICO) to relaunch a uranium mining project in the north of the country. The junta that has ruled the west African country since a military coup in 2023 advocates sovereignty over the country's mineral resources, including uranium. MAMICO is 60 per cent owned by the Australian Atomic Eagle group and 40 per cent by the Niger government. The agreement provides, among other things, for the payment of an initial fee of \$10 million, capacity-building for the mining administration, local development and the creation of around 1,000 jobs for young Nigeriens. Uranium mining is at the heart of a standoff between the junta and former colonial power France — AFP

El Nino could cause 451,000 extra heat deaths

THIS year's powerful El Nino weather pattern could lead to 451,000 additional heat-related deaths worldwide through February as it turbocharges global temperatures, according to projections published on Wednesday. The warming phenomenon, which was declared in June and is due to peak later this year, is on course to be the strongest on record, amplifying the effects of human-induced climate change. The estimates by the Climate Impact Lab at the University of Chicago found that developing countries would be hit hardest by the heat-related toll in the June to February period. The Sahel region in Africa could have an additional 66,800 heat deaths compared to a normal year, with nearly half of that number in Nigeria alone. An additional 19,300 are projected in Indonesia and 19,400 in the Philippines, Vietnam, Thailand, and Cambodia. — AFP

22 SEPTEMBER

Thailand injects stimulus to shield economy

THAILAND'S cabinet approved a new round of economic relief measures on Tuesday, utilizing up to 42.69 billion baht (about US\$1.28 billion) from the emergency loan decree to navigate a prolonged global energy crisis. Thai Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance Ekniti Nitithanprapas said the ongoing Middle East conflict has driven up global oil prices, causing domestic inflation to reach 2.5 per cent and the producer price index to rise by nearly 10 per cent. Speaking at a press conference, Ekniti noted that the three waves of economic headwinds, following spikes in energy prices and living costs alongside sluggish household spending, have necessitated government intervention to further protect the public. According to the Ministry of Finance, the relief package is divided into two primary initiatives designed to sustain purchasing power and cover approximately 47 million eligible Thais. — Xinhua

Houthi warns Türkiye, Pakistan against joining Saudi

YEMEN'S Houthi leader Abdul-Malik al-Houthi warned Türkiye and Pakistan against involvement in the group's escalating confrontation with Saudi Arabia. In a televised speech broadcast by the Houthi-run al-Masirah TV channel, al-Houthi accused Saudi Arabia of seeking military support from Türkiye and Pakistan as the conflict intensifies both inside Yemen and across the Saudi-Yemeni border. He urged the two countries not to become "entangled" in the conflict in pursuit of political or economic interests with Riyadh. Al-Houthi also alleged that Saudi Arabia was seeking to bring fighters from Syria into the conflict, without providing evidence to support the claim. The warning comes as the Houthi-Saudi confrontation spills increasingly across the border. — Xinhua

Tensions put Saudi oil exports under pressure

ESCALATING tensions across the Middle East are increasingly weighing on Saudi Arabia, one of the world's largest oil exporters. As the ongoing US-Iran conflict continues to disrupt shipping through the Strait of Hormuz, growing hostilities between Yemen's Houthi group and Saudi Arabia are also threatening Riyadh's oil export routes through the Red Sea, putting mounting pressure on Saudi Arabia's oil sector. Like other major oil-exporting countries in the region, Saudi Arabia has traditionally shipped its crude oil from eastern ports into the Gulf and then through the Strait of Hormuz to international markets. An average of about 20 million barrels per day of crude oil and petroleum products passed through the Strait of Hormuz in 2025. — Xinhua

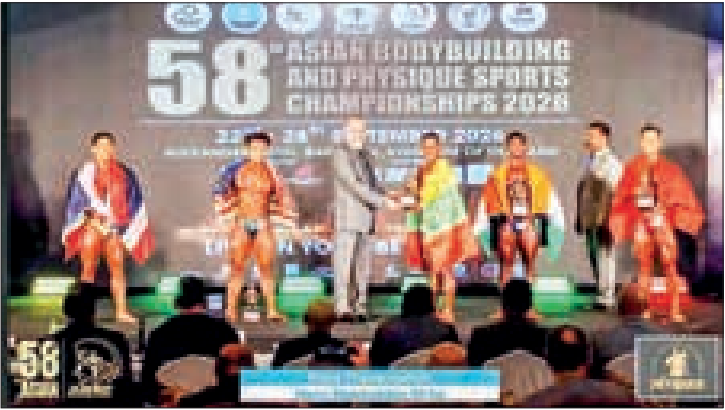

Asian Games: S Korea denies Japan basketball gold in closely fought final

SOUTH Korea withstood a furious comeback from Japan to win the Aichi-Nagoya Asian Games women’s basketball final 75-70 on Saturday, with the result mirroring the men’s final six days earlier.

With Japan using the tournament to audition new talent in the buildup towards the 2028 Olympics,

the gold-medal game pitted coach Yuko Oga’s youthful side against a full-strength South Korean outfit.

South Korea jumped out to a 27-15 lead at the end of the first quarter and maintained a double-digit buffer until Japan surged back into contention in the fourth quarter.

Japan closed to within

four points at 72-68 before Riho Akagi went to the free throw line with 16.6 seconds left. The guard missed both attempts, but forward Haru Owaki grabbed the rebound from the second miss and laid it in for a 72-70 deficit.

South Korea’s Kang Lee Seul went two-for-two at the opposite stripe to re-

store her team’s lead to two possessions before Lee Hae Ran earned a trip to the line and hit one of two. Forward Lee poured in a game-high 24 points, while Owaki led Japan with 23 off the bench. Japan was aiming to win its first Asian Games women’s basketball gold since 1998 in Bangkok. — Kyodo

Can AI detectors reliably spot machine writing?

CANADIAN-HAITIAN writer Thelyson Orelie denies allegations that his best-selling debut novel was written using artificial intelligence. The controversy erupted after an X account claimed an AI detector called Pangram found the book was largely generated by text tools. When AFP tested excerpts, results ranged from entirely human to 100 per cent AI-generated. Experts explain that AI detectors analyze linguistic ties, structural patterns, and repetitive phrasing. However, specialists warn these tools remain unreliable, noting they can mistakenly flag a distinct human authorial style as machine-generated. Critics argue the novel's formulaic structure raises doubts, while Orelie attributes his unique style to Caribbean traditions. — AFP

Japanese fiction boom looks set to endure, experts say

Japanese translated fiction boom charms foreign readers in Britain.

AN unusual mix of stories about alienation, feminism, cats and coffee shops is charming foreign audiences as a boom in translated Japanese fiction shows little sign of fading. Industry insiders told Kyodo News that Japan remains the leading source of translated fiction in Britain and expect its dominance to continue for the foreseeable future, despite growing competition from other East Asian countries and regions.

Authors such as Asako Yuzuki ("Butter" and "Hooked"), Sayaka Murata ("Convenience Store Woman"), Mieko Kawakami ("Breasts and Eggs") and Hiromi Kawakami ("Strange Weather in Tokyo") have become familiar names among readers of translated fiction. But they are just the tip of the iceberg.

Britain's "Bookseller" trade magazine lists 20 Japanese books in its top 50 of translated fiction in the first half of this year.

The same period in 2025 saw 23 Japanese works in the top 50, according to data from NielsenIQ BookScan. The boom really took off around 2018, with a wide variety of genres proving popular with Western audiences.

There is "weird girl fiction", typified by Sayaka Murata's "Convenience Store Woman", in which an idiosyncratic protagonist is alienated from mainstream society but often embraces her outsider status. — Kyodo

A 3,000-year-old glimpse into China's Bronze Age technological prowess

China's ancient Tonglushan copper mining site showcases advanced technology.

China is famous for its ancient inventions: papermaking, printing, gunpowder and the compass. But there is far more to its technological legacy than these.

One notable achievement is the Tonglushan ancient copper mining site. More than 3,000 years ago, people in China were already mining and refining high-purity copper on a large scale at this site, a feat that put them some

2,000 years ahead of the rest of the world. Located in Daye, Hubei Province in central China, this site has welcomed more than 20 million visitors since it opened in the 1980s, including tourists from Japan, the Republic of Korea, Europe and Africa.

It received official designation as a National

Archaeological Site Park in 2025 and is now working towards UNESCO World Heritage status.

To further showcase China's ancient industrial achievements to international visitors, a large-screen presentation launched last year features English subtitles alongside Chinese ones, while

the park has also opened an educational workshop for visitors from China and abroad.

"The site shows that China has long had the capacity to develop advanced technologies independently. It also strengthens our cultural confidence," said Chen Jiayi, a staff member at the site park. — Xinhua

El Nino rewrites menu in world's top restaurants

A record-breaking El Nino will likely force the world's top chefs to rethink their menus ahead of droughts, floods and heatwaves upending global food systems.

Ants are disappearing from the table in Brazil, one Danish chef is opting for cocoa-free chocolate and Japan is serving up warm-water fish, culinary stars disclosed at the Apaxoa gastronomic festival on Mexico's Caribbean coast. United Nations experts have predicted an exceptionally strong cycle of the El Nino climate phenomenon, which causes global changes in winds and rainfall as well as erratic weather conditions.

The cream of the culinary crop, looking ahead

to unpredictable ingredient availability, quality and prices, are rearranging their shelves accordingly.

But for these acclaimed chefs, extreme weather events and their habit of turning the kitchen

upside down are nothing new. "In the last three years, I've been creating an annual menu that I end up adjusting many times, almost weekly, because certain products aren't available," Brazilian chef Alex Atala told AFP. "Ants,

for example, this year are only available for customers who specifically ask to try them," said Atala, whose Sao Paulo restaurant DOM plucks ingredients from the Amazonian wilderness to reinterpret Indigenous traditions.

El Nino can also massively disrupt transportation, said Atala. Flooded roads or wildfires "delay a product that should be fresh, and by the time it arrives, it's no longer in good condition," he said. Climate change and El Nino are heavily disrupting global gastronomy. Spanish chef Quique Dacosta highlights how severe storms destroy essential ingredients like Albufera rice and cause devastating reservation cancellations. — AFP
