Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

Remitting prison sentences

Myanmar National Human Rights Commission Statement 1/2025

In commemoration of the 77th Anniversary of 1. Independence Day, which falls on 4 January 2025, the State Administration Council issued State Administration Council Order 1/2025, which granted remission of one-sixth of the remaining sentences to be served, for prisoners incarcerated in respective prisons, jails, and camps under existing laws; Order 2/2025, a total of 5,864 prisoners serving sentences in respective prisons, jails, and camps were conditionally pardoned; Order 3/2025, commuted the life sentences of 144 prisoners in respective prisons and jails to the 15-year imprisonment, and Order 4/2025, 180 foreign prisoners from the respective prisons has remitted and deported. The Myanmar National Human Rights Commission welcomes these acts of clemency.

- 2. These actions reflect the positive step in terms of human rights, and it is expected that the released prisoners will be able to participate in some way in establishing a State based on democracy and a federal system. The granting of remission and deportation of foreign prisoners is also viewed as a step to promote friendly relations between nations.
- 3. The Myanmar National Human Rights Commission is delighted to share the joy with the relevant family members of those who have been released and hopes that similar positive human rights and humanitarian actions will continue to be carried out.

Actress donates K2.5M to support artistes in film industry

ACTRESS Saung Yoon San has donated K2.5 million to the Myanmar Motion Pictures Organization (MMPO) to support its plan to distribute rice, cooking oil, and other food supplies as a New Year donation to members of the film industry, according to MMPO Vice-Chairman U Aye Kyu Lay. MMPO plans to provide rice and food supplies to its members for the 15th time in January 2025. Film industry members and donors have reportedly been contributing both monetary and food donations to make this possible. Remember the impacts of Typhoon Yagi

HE worst and most dangerous natural disasters Myanmar people experienced in 2024 indicated Typhoon Yagi which struck many regions and states across the nation. Impacts of the typhoon immediately destroyed a large number of lives and property of the people. It was unforgettable and regrettable incident in the history of Myanmar.

The typhoon "Yagi," centring over the South China Sea, which severely struck China and Vietnam, has affected nearly six million children in the Southeast Asia region, according to a statement released by UNICEF. It was seeming a dreadful dream for the society. It is necessary to take a lesson from the event of Yagi how to overcome similar challenges in the future.

Typhoon Yagi struck the Southeast Asia region, severely caused heavy rains and strong winds across Vietnam, Thailand, Laos, and Myanmar. On 18 September, three deaths were reported in Thailand due to Typhoon Yagi, bringing the total number of fatalities to 18.

Natural disasters are unavoidable events. While humans cannot prevent the occurrence of disasters, we can mitigate their impacts on lives and property. By applying modern technology and human intelligence, everyone has the opportunity to safely navigate the challenges posed by these events. Preparedness is a key, as it can significantly reduce casualties. Therefore, everybody needs to make preparations to overcome challenges similar to Typhoon Yagi in the future.

The death toll in the region has risen to 537 people.

Due to the cyclone, around six million children have experienced hardship, and UNICEF reported that access to clean drinking water, education, healthcare, food, and shelter has become scarce. The impacts of the damages caused by the Typhoon have been most severely felt by vulnerable children and families, who are the least able to cope with the consequences.

The number of fatalities from Typhoon Yagi's impacts in Myanmar has surged to 384, with 89 people went missing. This tragic toll underscores the urgent need for Myanmar to intensify its efforts in disaster prevention and invest in training for search and rescue operations, ensuring that lives can be saved more effectively during future disasters.

Authorities should recruit volunteer youths by offering essential supplies and support, along with complete rescue equipment, to ensure their participation in search and rescue efforts. Addition-

ally, proper training must be provided to help these youths gain the experience needed to address rescue challenges effectively in a short timeframe. Organizing these volunteer groups will create reliable forces that can assist the State and the public during times of natural disasters.

By applying modern technology and human intelligence, everyone has the opportunity to safely navigate the challenges posed by these events. This week, 'Tain Pachi' is an example of such a novel; it has achieved great success as a movie and is being republished for the second time.

He omitted cases such as Tain Pachi breaking her arms from being beaten by her husband, who cheated in front of her while she was bedridden after tummy surgery, and her husband cursing at her just before she entered the surgery room. He continued, stating that every girl can be Tain Pachi.

Similarly, concerning the comparison between the novel and the movie, he added, "It is difficult for the script to be the same in both the novel and the movie. While the creative process is similar, the final products differ. I did not influence the production regarding the actors for this movie. The movie did not include the imprisonment of the two cheaters, but the book detailed their imprisonment. I urge everyone to read the book."

Manmohan Singh as PM pulled 138 million people out of 'below poverty line'

Montek Singh Ahluwalia praised Manmohan Singh for lifting 138 million people above the poverty line, highlighting India's record economic growth under his leadership.

ECONOMIST Montek Singh Ahluwalia praised former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh for his efforts to bring 138 million people out of the 'below poverty line (BPL)'. Ahluwalia, former Deputy Chairman of the Planning Commission of India, said that India grew faster in terms of economic growth during Singh's tenure than it had ever done.

"People forget that when

you are Prime Minister you are not running an individual department. You have to be judged by how the country performs. So if you put that criterion, during his tenure, India grew faster than it had ever done before and it grew faster than it has grown since. In his period, 138 million people were pulled above the poverty line for the first time. Before that, the percentage of people below the poverty line was falling, but the population was expanding and so did the number of people below the poverty line," Montek told ANI in an exclusive interview. Montek further said that Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's tenure must be judged in its entirety. The Indo-US nuclear deal that freed India from nuclear restrictions was the most important achievement during his second term, he added. — ANI

Qatar's foreign merchandise trade surplus achieves QR57.7 billion in Q3 2024

IN Q3 of 2024, Qatar recorded a merchandise trade balance surplus (difference between total exports and imports) of QR57.7 billion down from QR 60.9 billion in Q3 2023.

According to figures released by the Planning and Statistics Authority on Wednesday Aand carried by Qatar News Agency (QNA), the value of Qatar's total exports in Q3 2024 (including exports of domestic goods and re-exports) amounted to QR87.8 billion. This decreased by QR2.0 billion (2.2 per cent) compared to Q3 2023, which amounted to total exports of QR89.8 billion. However, it increased by nearly QR2.8 billion, or 3.3 per cent, compared to Q2 2024.

The Q3 2024 year-on-year (Y-o-Y) decrease in total exports was mainly due to lower exports of Mineral fuels, lubricants, and related materials by QR5.0 billion (6.5 per cent), and Miscellaneous Manufactured Articles by QR0.1 billion (22.0 per cent).

On the other hand, increases were recorded mainly in Chemicals and Related Products by QR1.5 billion (24.5 per cent), Machinery and Transport Equipment by QR1.2 billion (53.3 per cent), Manufactured Goods Classified Chiefly by Material by QR0.4 billion (17.1 per cent), and Crude Materials, Inedible, Except Fuels by QR0.1 billion (24.8 per cent). — ANI

After the delegation returns from Brussels, the coalition and then the government will convene. We will discuss the measures that we will take to adequately respond to [Ukrainian President Volodymyr] Zelensky's sabotage," Fico said.

An agreement between Russia's Gazprom and Ukraine's Naftogaz was concluded on 30 December 2019 and expired on Tuesday. — SPUTNIK

China announces month-long online shopping event for Spring Festival

CHINA will launch a month-long online shopping event for festive goods ahead of the upcoming Spring Festival, which falls on 29 January this year.

The event, initiated by the Ministry of Commerce and organized under the guidance of several government departments and the China Consumers Association, will run from 7 January to 5 Febuary.

According to the ministry, this event marks the first nationwide online sales promotion following the inscription of the "Spring Festival, social practices of the Chinese people in celebration of traditional new year" on the UNESCO Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity in December 2024.

The event aims to meet people's consumption needs during

Various Chinese regions and e-commerce platforms will host distinctive events to celebrate the Spring Festival, including local product promotions as well as exhibitions and performances themed on intangible cultural heritage, according to the ministry. For instance, starting 22 January Shanghai will host a Silk Road e-commerce Spring Festival event to promote tourism products for visitors traveling to China for the Spring Festival. — Xinhua

Boeing adds new manufacturing quality control checks

US aviation giant Boeing announced Friday that it has implemented over a dozen new quality control checks as it looks to rebuild trust following several recent high-profile incidents.

The company has been under pressure from US regulators following several safety scares, including a mid-flight Alaska Airlines panel blowout that required an emergency landing in January 2024.

Boeing's new "Safety & Quality Plan" includes enhanced training for quality control inspectors and mechanics, and a new random quality audit when aircraft parts are removed and returned, it said in a statement posted on its website. - AFP

Ghana announces visa-free entry for African passport holders

US federal judge OKs NYC congestion pricing plan



GHANA'S outgoing President Nana Akufo-Addo Friday announced visa-free travel for all African passport holders from the start of this year, marking a step towards continental economic integration.

The announcement came during his final state of the nation address as he prepares to step down on 6 January after two terms in office. "I am proud to have approved visa-free travel to Ghana for all African passport holders, with effect from the beginning of this year," Akufo-Addo said in his speech to parliament.

"This is the logical next step to the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) and the workings of the largest trading bloc in the world," he said. "All these are essential elements to the realization of the AU's Agenda 2063, which envisages an integrated and connected Africa by 2063," he added, referring to the African Union's development blueprint for a 50-year period. — AFP

Japanese woman, world's oldest person at 116, dies

TOMIKO Itooka, a 116-year-old Japanese woman recognized as the world's oldest person, has died of old age, an official of the western Japan city of Ashiya where she lived said Saturday.

Born on 23 May 1908 in Osaka as the eldest of three siblings, Itooka died Sunday night at the nursing home where she resided, the city government in Hyogo Prefecture said.

Itooka became the oldest living person in Japan in December 2023 following the death of Fusa Tatsumi, a 116-year-old in Kashiwara, Osaka Prefecture.

She was subsequently recognized as the world's oldest living person by Guinness World Records in September 2024, following the death of the previous holder, Maria Branyas Morera, a 117-year-old from Olot, Catalonia, Spain. – Kyodo

Mourners prepare for Jimmy Carter's farewell

MOURNERS are gearing up to pay their respects to Jimmy Carter, marking the start of a meticulously planned six-day farewell for America's longest-living president on Saturday.

Carter died on 29 December at the age of 100 in his hometown of Plains, Georgia.

Carter's state funeral officially begins on Saturday with Secret Service agents from his current and former protective detail carrying his casket to a hearse for a tour through Plains.

The motorcade bearing his remains is to pause at Carter's boyhood family peanut farm while a farm bell rings 39 times in honour of America's 39th president.

Carter's remains will be flown on Tuesday morning from a military base in Georgia to Joint Base Andrews outside Washington on a US Air Force plane.

Syria FM hopes Saudi visit opens new chapter

SAUDI Foreign Minister Prince Faisal bin Farhan met on Thursday Syrian official Asaad Al-Shaibani in Riyadh to discuss Syria's future.

This follows a Saudi delegation's meeting last month with Syria's new leader, Ahmed al-Sharaa, in Damascus.

Sharaa, head of the Islamist Hayat Tahrir al-Sham group, played a key role in the rebel offensive that ousted President Bashar al-Assad in December. In a recent interview, Sharaa emphasized Saudi Arabia's important role in Syria's future and highlighted investment opportunities for neighbouring countries.

Over 13 years of civil war have devastated Syria's economy and infrastructure. While Saudi Arabia initially opposed Assad, severing ties in 2012, it has since restored relations and helped reintegrate Syria into the Arab League. – AFP

India implements new subscription scheme

THE One Nation One Subscription (ONOS) scheme was implemented in India on Wednesday to provide students and researchers from government-run higher education institutions and research and development centres with access to international scholarly journals.

"The goal is to ensure that India's academic and research communities are equipped with the best global resources, fostering innovation and enhancing the quality of research across disciplines," said an official statement issued by the Ministry of Education. The scheme envisioned India's emergence as a leading global power driven by cutting-edge research, technological advancement, and self-sustained progress. "Through such initiatives, India is preparing to build on its rich legacy of knowledge, positioning itself at the forefront of global innovation and discovery," added the statement. The scheme would provide access to more than 13,000 scholarly journals from 30 major international publishers. It would benefit nearly 18 million students, faculty, and researchers. –Xinhua

Panama marks canal handover anniversary

PANAMA on Tuesday marked the 25th anniversary of the United States' handover of its interoceanic canal, a milestone overshadowed by President-elect Donald Trump's threat to demand control be returned to Washington.

The anniversary came two days after the death of former US president Jimmy Carter, who in 1977 signed the treaties that led to the vital waterway's eventual transfer decades later.

Former Panamanian president Mireya

Moscoso, who oversaw the symbolic turnof-the-century handover, told AFP that "today we feel the same emotion" as on that occasion 25 years ago. At Tuesday's ceremony, neither Mulino nor other speakers addressed Trump's recent threats. The US President-elect angered Panamanians by claiming he would demand the canal "be returned to us" if Panama failed to ensure its "secure, efficient, and reliable operation". Panama's political leaders and citizens strongly rejected his remarks. – AFP

Cambodia urges caution over respiratory virus HMPV

THE Cambodia's Ministry of Health (MoH) on Monday urged people to take precautions over human metapneumovirus (HMPV) in the cold season. In its press statement, the MoH said the HMPV causes respiratory diseases with symptoms similar to flu, including fever, cough, nasal congestion, sore throat, and sneezing.

"The virus can cause serious illness among infants, children, the elderly over 65 of age or people with weakened immune systems," it said. HMPV was not a new virus as it was first detected in 2001 in the Netherlands, and Cambodia also detected the disease among children between 2007 and 2009, the MoH said.

It added that most of the cases were mild, but about six to 16 per cent of the infected children could progress to bronchiolitis or pneumonia. – Xinhua

China creates department to boost low-altitude economy

CHINA'S top economic planner has established a department to support the development of the burgeoning low-altitude economy, as the country strives to foster new growth drivers.

The new department, under the National Development and Reform Commission (NDRC), is responsible for formulating and organizing the implementation of strategic as well as mid-term and long-term

development plans, providing policy recommendations, and coordinating major issues related to the low-altitude economy, according to the NDRC.

The department has recently held symposiums on advancing the construction of low-altitude infrastructure and low-altitude intelligent network systems, according to the latest updates on the NDRC website. – Xinhua

Man Utd's fresh start turns sour on Ratcliffe's watch

MANCHESTER United fans began 2024 buoyed at the prospect of a new dawn but the winds of change at Old Trafford under Jim Ratcliffe have so far only hastened the demise of the English giants.

Twelve months on, United travel to bitter rivals Liverpool on Sunday fearing another humiliation on the back of four consecutive defeats that have left new manager Ruben Amorim stressing his side are in a Premier League relegation battle.

AFP Sports looks at what has gone wrong on and off the field since British billionaire Ratcliffe bought a \$1.6 billion (£1.25 billion) minority stake in the club and took control of the club's football operations.

United's FA Cup victory in May, a brief moment of triumph, came at a significant cost. Beating Manchester City to lift the trophy was seen as a potential turning point for coach Erik ten Hag, but instead, it became a pyrrhic victory.

The Dutch coach, who had overseen a disastrous eighth-place finish — United's worst-ever Premier League position — seemed destined for the sack before the cup win. His stay was extended after an internal review, but his struggles continued, with only three wins from the opening nine games of the new season.

In October, United opted to part ways, paying a £10.3 million buyout to bring in Ruben Amorim from Sporting Lisbon. However, his arrival has failed to spark an improvement. With just two wins from eight league matches, United find themselves 14th, only seven points above relegation.

Osaka reaches 1st WTA final since return at ASB Classic

JAPAN'S former world No 1 Naomi Osaka reached the ASB Classic tennis tournament final in Auckland on Saturday after beating Alycia Parks of the United States 6-4, 6-2 in the semifinals.

The four-time Grand Slam title winner made her first WTA singles final since last January when she returned after giving birth and taking some time off. "I've actually never gotten to the final of the tournament the week before Melbourne, so this is like a career first for me," the

two-time Australian Open champion said on the WTA website.

"I'm really happy. There's always constantly things to improve or to get better, no matter how old you are." The 27-year-old, currently ranked 57th, broke back immediately against her 78thranked opponent and got another break en route to winning the opening set. ENVIRONMENTALLY friendly and highly durable bagworm silk is set to be used in a commercial application for the first time, according to a Nagoya-based firm.

Bagworm moth larvae expel the versatile thread from their mouths to bind together leaves, twigs and other materials into nests to protect themselves. The biodegradable thread has proven to be tougher and more flexible than silk extracted from silkworms or spider web, according to Kowa Co. Kowa, whose business fields range from textile trading to the manufacturing of medical products, has developed sheets from the thread that can be mixed with carbon fiber reinforced polymers used in applications such as golf clubs and other sporting equipment to create a light and strong material. — Kyodo

THE United States' top government doctor on Friday called for health warnings on alcoholic drinks to highlight that they cause cancer and urged a reassessment of daily consumption limits due to the risks.

Surgeon-General Vivek Murthy said that the connec-

tion between alcohol and cancer has been known since the 1980s, with mounting evidence reinforcing the dangers. Yet, mandatory warning labels fail to address the health threat. "Alcohol is a well-established, preventable cause of

he added, underscoring the urgent need for public education. Introduced in 1988, the existing warning label only states that "women should not drink alcoholic beverages during pregnancy because of the risk of birth defects" and that "consumption of alcoholic low. A 2019 survey showed only 45 per cent of Americans recognized alcohol's cancer risk. Additionally, 17 per cent of alcohol-related cancer deaths occur in those within recommended drinking limits, suggesting the need for reevaluation. — AFP
