

2025 MULTIPARTY DEMOCRACY GENERAL ELECTION

- Domestic election observers who wish to monitor the multiparty democratic general election, which will begin in phases on 28 December 2025, may apply for election observation permits at the Union Election Commission (UEC), as well as the relevant Region/State, District, and Township Election Subcommissions from today until 5 December 2025.
- The Union Election Commission announced on 16 September 2025 that domestic election observers must follow the Code of Conduct for Observers, issued under Notification 68/2025, and adhere to the procedures set out for their observation activities under Notification 69/2025. These notifications are available for viewing and can be downloaded from the Union Election Commission's official website https://www.uec.gov.mm.
- The Union Election Commission has also announced that international election observers will be allowed to monitor
 the multiparty democratic general election. Invitations will be extended directly to representatives of relevant countries and international organizations. In addition, through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, invitations will be sent to
 representatives of foreign embassies, consulates, and permanent missions that maintain diplomatic relations with
 the Government of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar.

80% of Ayeyawady beach hotels booked for Thadingyut

DURING the upcoming long Thadingyut holiday in October, 80 per cent of hotel rooms at seaside resorts including Chaungtha, Ngwehsaung, and Shwethaungyan beaches, and Goyangyi Island have already been booked in advance by domestic and foreign tourists, according to the Directorate of Hotels and Tourism.

In the Ayeyawady Region, these seaside resorts possess favourable geographical conditions along the coastline and coastal areas. The regional government is striving to develop them into a vibrant and sustainable tourism industry while also establishing them as long-term competitive tourist destinations. During public holidays, the influx of visitors to these beach resorts contributes not only to the growth of the tourism sector but also to the expansion of related services and the creation of job opportunities for local communities.

In the four seaside resorts of the Ayeyawady Region, more than 500,000 visitors arrived annually in 2023 and 2024. By August 2025, a total of 159,213 tourists had visited. Local hotel and guesthouse operators estimated



that, starting from this Thadingyut holiday and throughout the open tourism season, the number of visitors will surpass last year's figures.

In the Ayeyawady Region, the Ngwehsaung and Chaungtha beaches, which have good transportation access and sufficient infrastructure, are popular destinations regularly visited by both domestic and international travellers each year. Although reaching Goyangyi Island and Shwethaungyan Beach takes more time, their natural beauty continues to attract visitors. Hotel and guesthouse operators have observed that if transportation access is further improved, the number of tourists visiting these destinations could increase even more. "In the Thadingyut holiday, tourists are expected to flock to the beaches of the Ayeyawady Region. About 80 per cent of the rooms at the four main beaches have been booked in advance. In Ngwehsaung, there are 38 hotels, guesthouses, and lodges; in Chaungtha and Shwethaungyan, another 38; and including

Goyangyi Island, a total of 49,197 rooms are open for visitors. Tourism is an industry that succeeds only through collective effort. It is also a smokeless income-generating sector and can uplift the socio-economic status of a region. With hotel bookings already reaching 80 per cent for the Thadingyut holiday, new job opportunities are opening up, and the industry is bringing benefits to the country. Hotels are urged to provide the best possible service, while tourists are kindly requested to work together in ensuring that the natural beauty of the beaches is preserved and not harmed," said U Aung Thu Oo, director of the directorate.

The government also extends visa relaxation on the visa on arrival year by year to promote the tourism industry, and the dtirector of flights from Yangon to Pathein can earn a higher income like Thailand. The Ayeyawady Region government make efforts to attract international travellers by cooperating with different departments, hotelier committees and associations. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

cting President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, Chairman of the State Security and Peace Commission of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, Senior General Min Aung Hlaing attended the plenary summit of the World Atomic Week Forum 2025 with the title "From a New Technological Rollout to a New Worldview" at the Atom Museum in Moscow, the Russian Federation, on 25 September.

The "World Atomic Week Forum 2025" was attended by international leaders including the President of the Russian Federation, the high-level Myanmar delegation led by the Acting President and SSPC Chairman of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, the Prime Minister of Armenia, and the President of Belarus, as well as senior government officials and heads of nuclear energy organizations, world-class experts, executives of major companies, leaders from the CIS, Asia, Africa, and Latin America, and delegates from 105 countries.

The Acting President and SSPC Chairman of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, together with international leaders, senior government officials, and other attendees, were welcomed by Mr Alexey Likhachev, ROSATOM Director-General of the Russian Federation, and officials.

At the ceremony, ROSATOM Director-General Mr Alexey Likhachev made an opening speech, whereas the President of the Russian Federation delivered a keynote address.

The President of Belarus, the Prime Minister of Armenia, the Acting President and SSPC Chairman of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, the Prime Minister of the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia, and the IAEA Director-General, as well as senior government officials from various countries, heads of nuclear energy organizations, and world-class experts in attendance, delivered speeches on the occasion.

He said: The global energy demand is increasing annually, and according to the report of the International Energy Agency (IEA), by 2025 it is projected to rise by 2.2 per cent compared to 2024. Recognizing nuclear energy as a green, low-carbon power source, Myanmar aims to generate stable electricity from nuclear power and harness it to drive the country's economic development.

are being met by nuclear power. Under the World Net-Zero Carbon Emissions initiative, plans are being implemented to use renewable energy in combination with nuclear power. Nuclear energy is recognized as a form of green energy with low carbon emissions and the ability to provide a stable electricity supply.

In addition, nuclear technologies in agriculture help support safer food production that is more resilient to climate change impacts. Programmes such as genetic crop mutation breeding have produced crops that are resistant to drought, pests, and diseases. Likewise, sterile insect techniques have reduced the need for pesticides, helped protect ecosystems, and contributed to sustainable long-term harvests. For agriculture-based countries like ours, these advancements provide significant benefits.

In the field of medicine, radioisotopes and nuclear imaging technologies have transformed methods of disease detection and treatment. Early diagnosis of cancers, along with targeted therapies through radiotherapy, has saved millions of lives each year and greatly improved the quality of life for countless people. Nuclear medicine thus stands as a prime example of how the power of science can serve humanity.

While the peaceful use of nuclear energy across various sectors brings great benefits to humankind, there are also challenges. It is essential to properly manage radioactive waste to avoid harming natural ecosystems, to prevent radiation leaks from nuclear materials, and to ensure reliable safety systems that can avert nuclear accidents.

Myanmar, in its efforts to utilize nuclear energy, has since 2022 signed memorandums of understanding on cooperation with the Russian Federation and the State Atomic Energy Corporation (ROSATOM). This marked the beginning of laying the foundation for the country's nuclear energy development.

In February 2023, a Nuclear Technology Information Centre was opened in Yangon. Through this initiative, greater public and media awareness and understanding of Russia's extensive experience and advanced expertise in nuclear industries and technologies have been promoted.

In addition, Terms of Reference (ToR) for cooperation in developing national-level nuclear infrastructure were signed between the Russian Federation and Myanmar's Ministry of Science and Technology. Furthermore, in collaboration with the Russian Federation and ROSATOM, the Ministry of Science and Technology organized the Science Fair 2023 and the Science Fair 2024 at the Nuclear Technology Information Centre and the Yangon Technological University (YTU). These events provided Myanmar students with extensive knowledge and understanding of nuclear technology.

Under the scholarship programmes arranged by ROSATOM, both sides cooperate in the sustainable development of human resources in nuclear energy and nuclear technology, including work requirements of the Small Modular Reactor (SMR).

The Republic of the Union of Myanmar is implementing the nuclear energy plan aligned with three work pillars and three work phases under the timeline of ROSATOM in accord with the guidance of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA). Since its membership in 1957, Myanmar has been participating in the technical cooperation of the IAEA and cooperating with the IAEA to provide the funds and machinery to the IAEA, upgrade infrastructures, participate in technological cooperation in the development of human resources, conduct technological training courses and join technological cooperation projects.

The Myanmar delegation attended the nuclear law workshop organized by the IAEA in 2024 and revised Myanmar's nuclear law.


In 2025, delegates from 18 countries, including Myanmar, attended a regional cooperation training course on the siting of small-scale nuclear power plants within the implementation of national nuclear programmes. The course was organized for international experts under the leadership of ROSATOM Technical Academy and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA). As an IAEA member state, Myanmar has long made efforts to enable the use of nuclear applications in the country, but progress has been delayed for various reasons. Since 2022, Myanmar has been working with Russia to step up efforts, and with Russia's strong support, significant progress has been achieved.

As nuclear energy is a form of green energy with low carbon emissions, Myanmar aims to generate stable electricity from nuclear power and utilize it to drive national economic development.

Myanmar will work to further develop the use of nuclear technology in the health, agriculture, and industrial sectors. To ensure continuous human resource development, universities in Russia and Myanmar have signed memorandums of understanding for educational cooperation and are carrying out joint programmes.

Co-productions, however, offer a promising solution. Treated as domestic films in both countries, they face fewer distribution barriers, allowing filmmakers to cre-

audiences on both sides.

SRIFF plays a pivotal role in promoting such collaborations, providing a platform for dialogue between filmmakers and policymakers. This year, officials from ten Silk Road countries, including Malaysia, Uzbekistan, Indonesia, and Nepal, offered insights into their domestic filmmaking and distribution policies.

Malaysia, for example, offers up to a 35 per cent cash rebate for films incorporating local culture. Dato Kamil Othman, chairman of the National Film Development Corporation, encourages historical co-productions between China and Malaysia, such as stories about Zheng He's voyages to Southeast Asia, reflecting the shared heritage of many Malaysians with China.

Uzbekistan, with over a century of cinematic history, is producing around 55 historical films, 20 of which are slated for international co-production. The country aims to showcase its world cultural heritage alongside China, offering modern infrastructure, skilled professionals, and cost-effective production opportunities.

Indonesia presents a different kind of potential. While domestic films have dominated its box offices since 2022, the nation, with only 2,300 cinemas and more than 300 ethnic cultures spread

across nearly 2000 islands, offers ample room for international filmmakers to invest and explore.

Nepal is also opening its doors. KP Pathak, director of the Nepal International Film Festival, noted that Chinese films such as Up in the Wind (2013) have been successfully shot in Nepali resorts. The country looks forward to co-productions that highlight the Himalayas, ancient temples, and bring Nepali cinema to a global audience.

As the proverb goes, "many hands make light work". With diverse storytelling, scenic locations, skilled crews, and talented screenwriters, co-productions not only appeal to target audiences but also smooth the path for distribution. In today's competitive landscape, these collaborations are increasingly essential for filmmakers seeking both creative and market success.

19 new projects approved, creating over 4,000 jobs

MYANMAR Investment Commission approved four foreign investment projects and 15 local ventures yesterday.

These 19 projects encompass various sectors, including industry, services, electricity, transport, and communications, as well as breeding and marine sectors, with a total investment of US\$109.626 million and K417,542.12 million, resulting in the creation of 4,446 jobs for locals.

Union Minister U Mya Tun Oo, who is also Chair of the Myanmar Investment Commission, and commission members attended the meeting.

As of the end of August 2025, among the 53 investing countries, Singapore, China, and Thailand are the leading countries with the largest foreign investments in the country. Of 12 sectors, the power sector accounts for 28.32 per cent by drawing the most significant investments, followed by the oil and natural gas sector (24.68 per cent) and the industrial sector (14.58 per cent)

World Atomic Week Forum 2025 opens in Russia

THE opening ceremony of World Atomic Week Forum 2025 was held at the VDNKh centre in Moscow, Russia, on 25 September, and Deputy Prime Minister of the Russian Federation A V Novak and officials made opening speeches.

The experts, media representatives, and officials from over 100 countries attended the forum and discussed the potential future impacts of nuclear energy, scientific and technological energy sectors, environmental conservation, and healthcare. The forum included roundtable discussions, signing ceremonies for memorandums of understanding, and exhibitions, allowing attendees to explore and learn about energy production and related topics.

At the forum, a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between Russia's ROSATOM Technical Academy and Yangon Technological University of Myanmar. According to the agreement, the two countries will enhance cooperation in nuclear science, technology, research, and human resource development. This includes exchanging curricula and participating in international projects to implement joint initiatives.

Regarding these issues, Dr Soe Lin Aung, an official from Naypyidaw State Polytechnic University, said: —

Today, we signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between Yangon Technological University of Myanmar and Russia's RO-SATOM Technical Academy. After signing such an MoU between the Yangon Technological University and the ROSATOM Technical Academy, the first steps will include student exchanges, teacher exchanges related to education, collaborative research activities, and initiatives for cultural exchange.

Currently, there are already students from Myanmar studying at Russian universities with the support of ROSATOM. Russia is a global pioneer in nuclear energy. The chances for our students and teachers to learn at these universities provide great opportunities for our country's HR sector, research sector, and successful projects related to nuclear energy.

The rector of Rosatom Technical Academy said Myanmar students studying at universities in Russia have to simultaneously implement their own nuclear education programmes in Myanmar to develop nuclear education.

CBM sells over US\$1.3M to importers

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) sold US\$826,100 to edible oil-importing companies and over \$534,700 to fuel oil-importing companies on 25 September.

CBM sold \$300,000 to edible oil-importing companies and \$170,000 to fuel oil-importing companies on 24 September, in addition to an injection of 100,000 yuan into the market.

CBM announced on 23 September that it would pump \$22 million into the fuel sector.

Moreover, CBM sold \$800,000 to edible oil-importing companies and over \$99,000 to fuel oil-importing companies, in addition to an injection of over 8,500 yuan into the market on that day.

CBM injected over \$1.7 million into edible oil- and fuel oil-importing companies on 22 September, selling over \$1.29 million to edible oil-importing companies and over \$452,500 to fuel oil-importing companies.

CBM pumped 758,400 yuan and over \$500,000 into the financial market on 19 September.

Those US dollar injections went to edible oil-importing companies (over \$368,100), fuel-importing companies (over \$79,000) and those who made non-trade payments (over \$58,000).

CBM sold over \$1.15 million to edible oil-importing companies and \$540,056 to fuel oil-importing companies on 18 September.

CBM sold over \$1 million, 11 million yuan and four million baht in August. Furthermore, CBM also pumped over \$32 million, purchased from the companies working on a Cut, Make, and Pack basis, into the financial market. - NN/KK

DICA announces regulations to prevent removal of directors, shareholders

THE Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA) issued guidelines to protect against unauthorized removals of directors and shareholders. The registration and re-registration of companies on the online registry system MyCO commenced on 1 August 2018, in keeping with the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

DICA clarified regulations regarding unauthorized dismissal of directors and shareholders from companies and asked directors to prevent unwanted changes.

According to provisions stipulated by Sections 90, 95 and 189 (a) of the Myanmar Companies Law, regulations records include maintaining records of directors and shareholders, creating a MyCO accounts to hold company authority and register contact information (email, contact number) of the directors and shareholders so that the Registrar can contact them to ensure that any reported changes are only made with their knowledge and authorization, the DICA stated. - NN/KK

New Zealand median household net worth up 33%, wealth gap persists

NEW Zealand's median household net worth rose 33 per cent to 529,000 NZ dollars (US\$305,088) in the three years ended June 2024, driven primarily by higher real estate values, Stats NZ reported on Friday.

Owner-occupied dwellings and other real estate accounted for 48 per cent of total

household assets in the year ended June 2024, up from 43 per cent in the year ended June 2021, said a statement from the statistics department.

The wealthiest 20 per cent of households saw a 24 per cent increase in median net worth to 2.4 million NZ dollars (US\$1.38 million)

in the three-year period, the statement said.

Financial assets, such as pension funds, shares, and investment funds, dominated wealth holdings among the top 20 per cent, whereas other households held mostly non-financial assets, such as real estate and durable goods, it said. — Xinhua

Turkish Airlines inks big Boeing deal after Erdogan visits US

TURKISH Airlines announced on Friday a deal to buy up to 225 Boeing jets, one day after President Recep Tayyip Erdo-

gan made his first White House visit since 2019.

The more than twohour meeting between Erdogan and President

Donald Trump raised Ankara's hopes of seeing Washington lift sanctions that since 2020 have blocked it from buying American F-35 fighter jets.

The measures were imposed in retaliation for Turkey's purchase of the Russian S-400 missile defense system. Speaking to Turkish reporters on his flight home from Washington, Erdogan described a "sincere, constructive and productive atmosphere" during the talks. But he conceded that "resolving all problems in a single meeting is, of course, impossible". - AFP

S Korean banks' loan delinquency ratio rebounds in July

SOUTH Korean banks' loan delinquency ratio rebounded in July on more new delinquent loan than bad loan settlement, financial watchdog data showed Friday. The ratio of bank loan, at least one month overdue, to the total, gained 0.05 percentage points from a month earlier to 0.57 per cent at the end of July, after decreasing 0.12 per-

centage points in the previous month, according to the Financial Supervisory Service (FSS).

New delinquent loan came to 2.8 trillion won (US\$2.0 billion) in the cited month, higher than the settlement of non-performing loan worth 1.6 trillion won (1.1 billion dollars).

The delinquency ratio has roughly been on the

rise after hitting a bottom of 0.20 per cent in June 2022 on the back of lingering uncertainties over massive household debt. The country's central bank lowered its benchmark interest rate by 25 basis points in February and May each to 2.50 per cent after cutting it by the same basis points in October and November last year. — Xinhua

Afghanistan's trade volume up 30% in past 6 months

AFGHANISTAN'S trade volume reached US\$6.783 billion in the past six months with a 30-per-cent increase year-on-year, local media outlet TOLOnews reported on Thursday. The country's primary export commodities include raisins, figs, cotton, apricots, saffron, pistachios, grapes, beverages, and other agricultural products, TOLOnews quoted Akhundzada Abdul Salam Jawad, spokesperson for the Ministry of Industry and Commerce, as saying.

These goods are primarily exported to China, India, Pakistan, the United Arab Emirates, Kazakhstan, Turkmenistan and Iraq, according to the official. Exports during this period totaled 748 million dollars, up nine per cent year-on-year, according to the report.

NDONESIA has issued 1,012 golden visas to foreign citizens, securing more than 48 trillion rupiah (around US\$2.9 billion) in investment as of 23 September 2025, the Directorate General of Immigration under the Ministry of Immigration and Corrections said in a press release Friday.

"The achievement of the Golden Visa programme by September 2025 proves that Indonesia is becoming increasingly attractive to global investors and talent. We hope this positive trend will continue to support national development and strengthen the Indonesian economy," said Yuldi Yusman, acting director general of immigration, in the press release.

Of the total investment, 46.5 trillion rupiah came from foreign companies, 249.3 billion rupiah from individual investors, and 1.45 trillion rupiah from other categories. The programme has also contributed 12.96 billion rupiah to non-tax state revenue.

Launched in July 2024 to attract capital and talent, the golden visa grants residency for five to ten years to inves-

UK to launch digital ID scheme to curb illegal migration

UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer on Friday announced plans for a new nationwide digital ID in a bid to curb illegal migration, but the move faces strong opposition in a country that has long resisted identity cards.

The new digital ID will be held on people's phones and there will be no requirement for individuals to carry or be asked to produce it, the government said.

However, it will be "mandatory as a means of proving your right to work", a statement said.

"Let me spell it out, you will not

be able to work in the United Kingdom if you do not have digital ID," Starmer said during a speech Friday.

"It's as simple as that, because decent, pragmatic, fair-minded people, they want us to tackle the issues that they see around them."

The government, which hopes to introduce the ID by the end of the current parliament in 2029, said the drive would also make it simpler to apply for services like driving licences, childcare and welfare, while streamlining access to tax records.

Trump says not to allow Israeli annexation of West Bank

US President Donald Trump said on Thursday that he will not allow Israel to annex the West Bank, a "red line" drawn by Arab leaders amid efforts to seek a ceasefire deal in Gaza.

"I will not allow Israel to annex the West Bank. I will not allow it. It's not going to happen," Trump told reporters in the White House. "It's been enough. It's time to stop now," the president added, saying he had spoken to Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu.

Trump promised Arab and Muslim leaders that he would not allow the annex-

ation during a closed-door meeting on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly on Tuesday, a key promise in a 21-point plan presented by the Trump administration for ending the Israel-Hamas conflict and establishing a non-Hamas body to govern Gaza, Politico reported.

The latest plan comes as international pressure mounts on Israel amid a worsening humanitarian crisis in Gaza. Leaders and senior officials from Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Qatar, Egypt, Jordan, Turkiye, Indonesia and Pakistan attended the meeting. — Xinhua

Russian President Vladimir Putin, commenting on Belarusian President Alexander Lukashenko's proposal to build a nuclear power plant in eastern Belarus to supply electricity to new regions of Russia, stated that financing is not an issue if there is a consumer willing to buy electricity and pay the required tariff.

"The issue of financing is not even on the table. If there's a consumer who will buy electricity and pay the right tariff, it's not a problem at all," Putin said.

"That's the most important thing," Lukashenko responded to the Russian leader's comments. — SPUTNIK

"The question is no longer whether AI will transform our world — it already is," UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said at the High-level Multi-Stakeholder Informal Meeting to Launch the Global Dialogue on AI Governance.

"The question is whether we will govern this transformation together — or let it govern us," he said.

Recalling that one year ago, the Global Digital Compact, the first universal agreement on AI governance, was adopted at the United Nations, Guterres said the cornerstones of a global AI ecosystem were laid today that can keep pace with the fastest-moving technology in human history. — Xinhua

Trade talks 'advancing well', EU tells Southeast Asian countries

TALKS on free trade deals between the European Union and Malaysia, Thailand and the Philippines were "advancing very well", the EU trade commissioner said on Thursday as the bloc sought to cement commercial ties in Southeast Asia.

Maros Sefcovic's comments came two days after the EU signed a trade deal with Indonesia, the region's largest economy, after wrapping up nearly a decade of talks. "My message to my partners in ASEAN was that we do not want to stop here," Sefcovic told journalists before meeting economic ministers from the Association of Southeast Asian Nations in Kuala Lumpur. "We have been advancing very well in our free trade negotiations with Thailand, with the Philippines, but also with Malaysia," he said. — AFP
